Oregon Congress to Hold Annual Convention Here

The 47th convention of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers will be held in Medford April 25 through 28. Mrs. Leigh Gustison, Medford, Congress president, will preside at the event.

Convention management committee chairman is Mrs.

Owen Kunkel assisted by Mrs. Emerson Anderson.

The four-day conference will have its headquarters at the Medford hotel with the majority of the sessions at Hedrick Junior High school. The Congress has a membership of more than 100,000. About 1,000 are expected here for the convention.

The objectives of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, of which the Oregon Congress is a branch, are to promote the welfare of children and youth in home, school, church and community; to raise the standards of home life, to secure adequate laws for the care and protection of children and youth; to bring into closer relation the home and the school; and to develop between educators and the general public such united efforts as will secure for every child the highest advantages in physical, mental, social, and spiritual education.

This will be the second time in recent years that the Oregon Congress has held its annual convention in Medford.

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term open rush. William Turner, Medford, was pledged by Sigma Chi.



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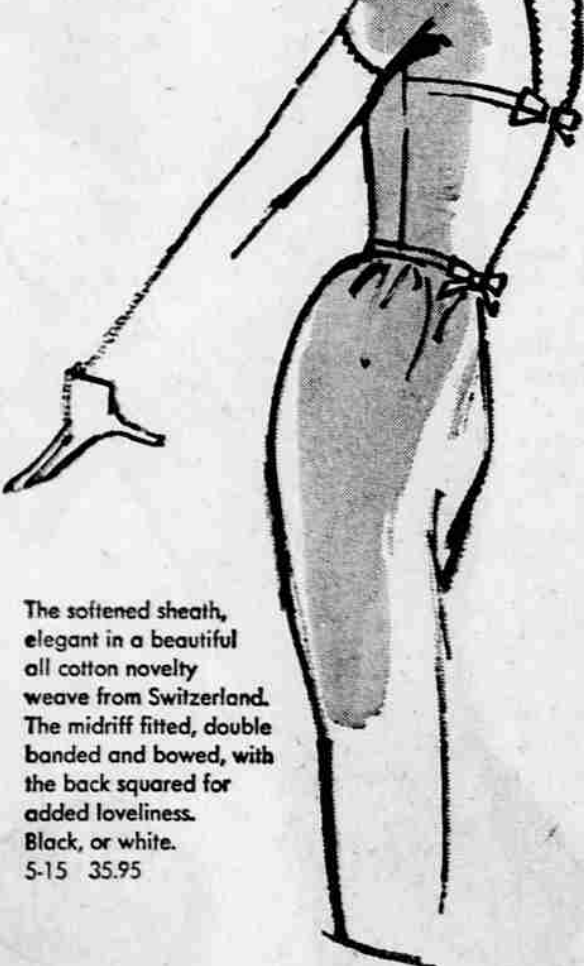
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
