Dallas Summer Clothes Have Ventilated Look

Dallas, Tex. (UPI)—Fashions these days have a better chance with us women if someone wisely pins a "look" on them.

The Dallas manufacturers, showing visiting reporters their summer collections of town and sportswear, didn't bother. So this observer produced her own label.

It is the ventilated look—the best way I can describe the cottons or blends of cottons and synthetics which are cool in color and construction. In color, white, black and white combinations, mist and celery green, and the blue greens dominate. As for construction, the manufacturers in this air-conditioned metropolis give us in the rest of the country a break for summer with full skirts, sleeveless tops, tops often baring the shoulders and held up only by string straps, and overblouses which allow for ventilation around the waistline.

Fabrics themselves are as cool as the garment industry, third in size in the nation, has yet been able to find them—lightweight ginghams, seersuckers, eyelets, voiles, batistes and piques.

Easy To Manage
And in all collections, the accent is on easy care—no iron, no wilt, no wrinkle, no fuss.

Here, by individual firms, are highlights of collections shown Monday.

—Jo Hardin. This firm showed collarless, eyelet cotton blouses with balloon sleeves, and skirts which had as many as seven yards of fabric in each.

—McKell-Stanlea. The coordinated separate of blouse and skirt ruled this sportswear collection, with the border design of a skirt repeated on a blouse neckline.

—Justin McCarty. In addition to separates, this firm showed a new version of a dacron synthetic which looks, feels and dyes like silk but washes readily.

—Jo Juniors. Hope Evans, a 1952 graduate of the Southern Methodist University Design school, featured the "split level" look—another way to describe a skirt with tunic, or top with mock bolero. One influence of the French actress Brigitte Bardot showed in a checked gingham, with a three-tier skirt, gathered for fullness.

Salute to Hawaii
—Parkland. This Texas firm looked to our newest state for inspiration and came up with block prints in the Hawaiian ti leaf motif.

—Lorch Manufacturing. Gingham again, used for everything from dresses to swim suits, and bandana shirts tied across the front of the midriff.

—Ike Clark. Dresses came with tunics, dresses came with stoles, and some dresses without any cover had necklines scooped almost to the waistline at the back, held together by criss-cross lacing.

—Donovan-Galvani. A play on the desert color theme at this firm, with its "sun reflection" tones of dust beige, rustic green, canyon yellow,

pond blue, desert red, and sand.

—Dallas Sportswear. The narrow, Capri pants or pedal pushers came in bold, geometric prints worn with solid-color tops, and several shirts in bandana print tied across the front of the midriff but has elastic insets so a girl could breathe.

The amateur section is open to persons who have won from one to four blue ribbons in standard flower shows, or any flower show. Titles for this section are "Wayward Spring," which is the show theme, "The Vivid Flower Marts," "Driftwood Dreams," "Daffy With the Noon Day Sun," and "Spring House Cleaning."

Titles for the advanced amateur section are "Wayward Spring," "All Her Paths Are Peace," "Two - Furs," "Spring in the East" and "A Triangle." Advanced amateurs are those who have won five or more blue ribbons in standard shows.

The schedule includes arrangement sections for men only, for juniors, and for miniature arrangements. The horticulture division lists various spring flowers and there is also a division for other garden clubs.

The show chairman stress that unless an arrangement can be classified under one of

the sections of the schedule, it may not be entered for judging. Entries will be accepted at the cafeteria from 7:30 to 9:30 a.m. the day of the show; judging will begin at 10 a.m. and the show will open to the public at 2 p.m. It will remain open until 8:30 p.m. and no entry may be removed before that time.
