Leukemia

When people ask for information on leukemia, I find it hard to give it because there are several types of the disease—some chronic, and one acute. There is even a type of blood change which looks like that of leukemia but does not go on to destroy the patient. The acute form of the disease is seen often in children. It used to kill within a few weeks, but today there are drugs that will often keep a child going for a year or more. I have seen acute leukemia bring death very quickly also to adults.

Certain types of leukemia in animals are due definitely to a virus, and it may be that some forms of the disease in man are due to such an infection. Leukemia is a cancer-like disease which involves the parts of the body which produce the white cells, or leucocytes, of the blood. As a result of overactivity, instead of a person's having a "white count" of perhaps 7,000, he can have one of 150,000 cells. Because the spleen, which lies next to the stomach up under the rib margins on the left side of the abdomen, fills up with these un-needed white cells, it often becomes so enormous that its lower edge reaches down below the navel. Because this large spleen can cause some pain, the patient may think he has "stomach trouble."

In chronic myeloid leukemia, most of the invaders of the blood are large cells resembling those of the bone marrow (hence the name myeloid, or marrow-like). In chronic lymphatic leukemia most of the white cells are small round "lymphocytes."

Today, much research is being done on the treatment of leukemia with new synthetic drugs and with radiation, and some very hopeful results are being obtained. The life of a patient is often prolonged, and there have been cases in which it looks as if a cure had been worked.
