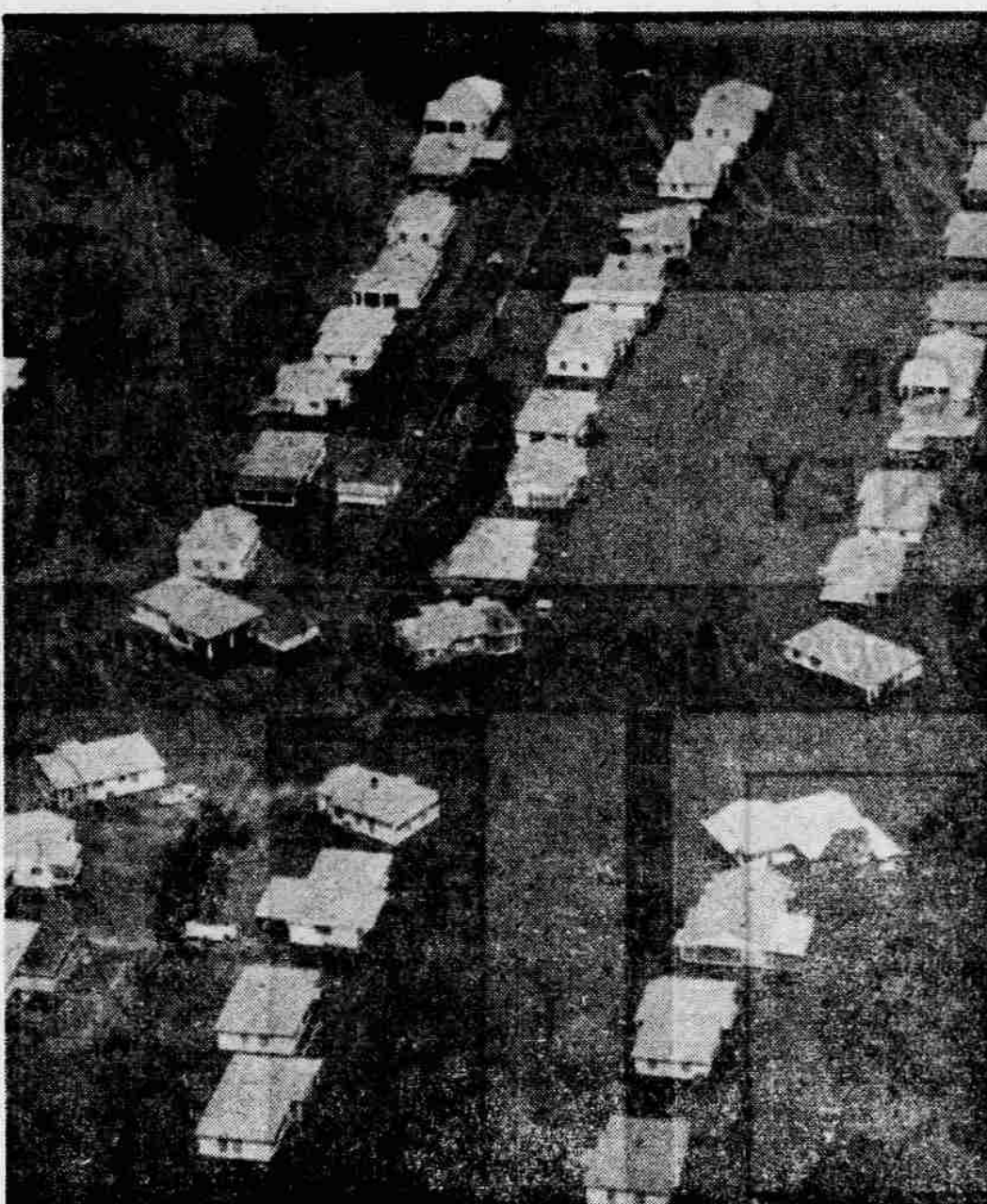

Vanguard Flight Changes Seen

Washington—(Science Service)—A team of scientists have discovered that solar radiation pressure accounts for the discrepancy between calculated and observed heights of Vanguard I when it is closest to earth.

Dr. Peter Musen, Robert W. Bryant and Ann Baillie, all of the theoretical division of the Goddard Space Flight Center of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration here, reported to Harvard College Observatory, Cambridge, Mass., that the height of Vanguard I at its perigee, or point closest to earth, varies over a period of 850 days due to the pressure exerted on the satellite by rays from the sun.

Dr. Musen told Science Service that over this period of time the satellite rises and sinks approximately a mile at the point closest to earth.

Dr. Musen began investigating the idea of solar radiation pressure at the suggestion of Dr. Robert Jastrow and John A. O'Keefe, both of NASA, when disturbances caused by the earth's irregular shape and the sun and moon's gravitational forces did not account for this variation.

Boat Sales Boom In Great Britain

London—(UPI)—In Britain, as in the United States, boats are booming. Boat makers say 1960 will be the biggest boom year yet in Britain. The National Boat Show early in the year reported orders four times as great as last year.

British boaters traditionally give pride of place to sailboats, but power boats and outboards are gaining in popularity—13,000 British outboard motors were sold within Britain last year.

With no point of Britain more than 75 miles from the sea, and with a variety of rivers, canals and other inland waters to choose from, boat builders see everyone in Britain as a potential customer.

Student Swamped With Tax Date

Moscow, Idaho—(UPI)—Ronald E. Hulbert, 25, a University of Idaho student here, has a little less time to make out his income tax return than he should have had.

The forms, addressed to him at "Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity House, University of Idaho, Moscow" arrived here stamped with a pale green seal of the Russian post office and the words "De Moskva."

The internal revenue service had thoughtfully included with the forms the publications "Tax Guide for Citizens Abroad" and "Income Tax Notices to U.S. Citizens Abroad."

Said Hulbert, "I've never even been out of the country."

Old Diesel Engine Finally Retired

St. Joseph, Mo.—(UPI)—The Pioneer Zephyr of the Burlington Railroad, billed as the nation's first streamliner when it started service, has been retired.

The diesel-powered stainless steel train made its first trip from Lincoln, Neb., to Kansas City with stops at St. Joseph and Omaha Nov. 11, 1934.

The train toured the nation before starting its regular Lincoln-Kansas City run, and it was the subject of a Hollywood film. The Pioneer will be taken to Chicago for museum display.
