The Medical Roundup

Cancer of Lung More Dangerous Than Tuberculosis
Drs. Katharine R. Boucot and David A. Cooper, of Philadelphia, have reported the results of a long-continued study of 6,137 middle-aged men who, each year now for six years, have had their lungs x-rayed. During this time 31 men developed lung cancer; 16 developed tuberculosis, and eight had a flare-up of an old tuberculosis.

A recent number of the AMA News has an article submitted by a member of the Society of Professional Business Consultants. He gives seven suggestions for physicians—all of them thought-producing. (1) See patients in an orderly fashion, keeping appointments, and giving adequate attention to each person. This, of course, is not always possible because many a doctor has an emergency or two run in on him during the day, and this gets him behind on his appointments. What is he going to do when one of his patients has a heart attack, or the child of one of his friends gets a toy soldier stuck in his throat? Also, what is the poor doctor to do when faced with a patient who is extremely talkative and very hard to get out of the office?

What is he to do when he gets more practice than he can handle? How then is he to keep away some of the patients who insist on seeing him? Years ago, when in San Francisco, I had to try to solve this problem, and I never found a good solution for it. I would not put up my fees to scare people away; and the taking on of assistants did not work well. I should have hunted for a good partner or two, but such are hard to find. (2) The doctor should give adequate time to each patient so that he can practice good medicine. This, of course depends on a man's being able to keep his practice within reasonable limits; and, as I have just said, this is sometimes almost impossible. Many patients won't accept the services of an assistant. (3) The doctor should reserve the right to determine what is an emergency. This sounds reasonable but is not always easy to do. Many a time in the early days when I made house-calls, a woman would telephone and say, "Get here as fast as you can, my sister is dying of a heart attack." When I got there, what did I find? A woman having hysterics, or just a tantrum of temper! Perhaps the woman had had an awful row with someone, and had gone into a sort of trance.

Imagine what making a call like that in the middle of a man's office hours can do to his appointments! Incidentally, let us remember that people who are that unreasonable, seldom pay for the house call. (4) A doctor should have adequate office space, and several dressing-rooms, which will enable him to go from one patient to another without wasting time. This is true, but in many cases, when a man's practice gets out of hand, he just cannot enlarge his "plant"; he cannot rent the rooms next door. (5) "The doctor should have a place in which he can talk over the telephone, or if tentatively." This would be ideal, but it is not easy to arrange for. (6) The doctor's employees should be friendly and sympathetic, honest, careful in detail, and able to relieve the physician of many of the burdens of memory. This is all very true.

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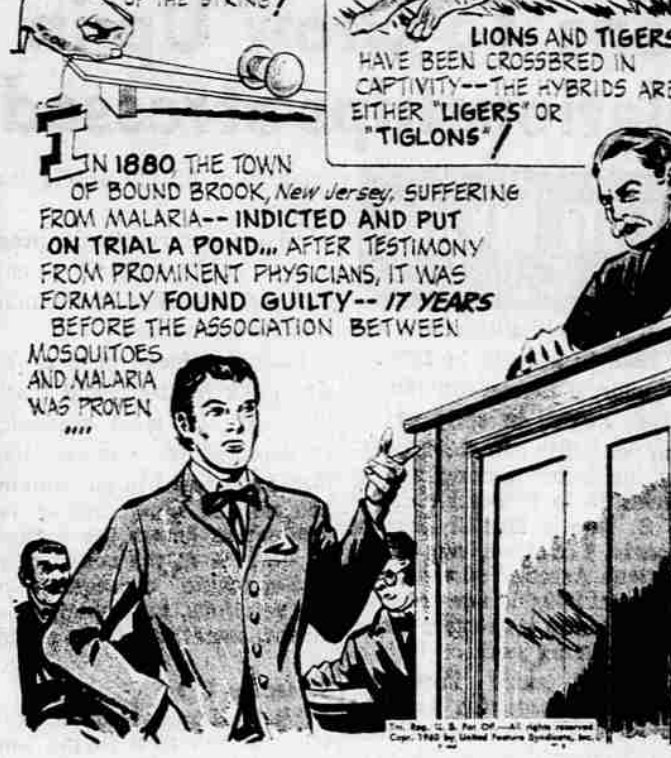
