

Judges Selected For Program

Seven educational, business and professional leaders have consented to serve to judge the Oregon Nevada California Fast Freight, Inc., and Southern California Freight Lines' Step to Knowledge scholarship program. Cliff Proctor, of the Medford terminal, has announced.

Members of the judging committee are Elliott Becken, assistant superintendent of Medford public schools, chairman; Bruce S. Hitt Jr., assistant county school superintendent; Seth M. Bullis, retired district manager of the California Oregon Power company; Arthur L. Straus, principal of Crater High school, Central Point; Gaylord W. Smith, principal Ashland High school; Ernest James, superintendent of Phoenix schools; and Dr. William T. Ward, Southern Oregon college, Ashland.

The committee will select one student who will graduate from either Medford, Crater, Ashland, Phoenix, St. Mary's, Butte Falls, Eagle Point or Prospect High schools. The winning student will receive one of 23 \$500 scholarship grants to any accredited college or university in the country.

Judging will be made on the basis of scholastic standing, extra curricular activities and educational aptitude. Students interested in applying for the Step to Knowledge scholarship may obtain information from the principal's office. All applications must be submitted by May 16.

Identification Of Takers Noted

Householders will be able to identify 1960 census takers by a red, white and blue identification card to be worn on the lapel of their coat. E. G. Bates, district supervisor, Eugene, has reported.

The card bears the seal of the department of commerce and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face, he said.

Persons purporting to be census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported to the local district census office in room 460, Lane county courthouse, Eugene, as soon as possible.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is brown and bears the legend "1960 Census of the United States," printed in green ink. In the portfolio, the census taker carries his supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other items.

56 Flu Cases Are Reported in County

A total of 56 cases of influenza were reported in Jackson county last week, 29 of them in Medford, Dr. C. I. Drummond, public health physician, said Friday.

Besides the 29 Medford cases, Central Point reported 9 cases, Rogue River 7, Phoenix 6, Ashland 4, and Shady Cove 1.

Other communicable disease cases reported last week include chicken pox, Medford 18, Gold Hill 4, Ashland and Central Point 1 each; pneumonia, Medford 2; measles, Ashland 21, Shady Cove, Rogue River and Medford, 1 each; German measles, Medford 4; and mumps, Gold Hill, Rogue River and Ashland 1 each.

Water Works Men Attend Conference

Corvallis - Three water works and purification plant operators from the Medford area were among 107 from the state who completed a special three-day short school last week at Oregon State college.

They are George D. Hannaford, Eagle Point; Robert L. Lee, Medford Water commission; and Floyd C. Taylor, Gold Hill.

The training course is offered each spring as a service to cities and water districts. Joint sponsors are the OSC school of engineering, the state board of health, League of Oregon Cities and the Northwest section of the American Water Works association.

This year's course included a basic program of training for new water works operators; training on water works administration and planning for the future when population increases will necessitate expansion of water works systems in many Oregon communities; and such topics as taste and odor control in water purification.

Incentive Payments Set for Wool Sellers

Farmers who have sold wool or unshorn lambs since April 1, 1959, probably have earned a payment under the Federal wool incentive program, according to a spokesman for the Jackson county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee.

However, to collect it, farmers should file an application in the county ASC office at the county courthouse not later than April 30, the spokesman reminded.

These applications are to cover wool and unshorn lambs marketed not later than March 31, 1960. If there is any sale detail which is not completed until after that date, the transaction goes over into the 1960 marketing and will be eligible for payment in 1961.

The program for 1960 which has been recently announced will be similar to that during the past year. The incentive price will continue at 62 cents per pound. To encourage the best possible job of marketing the farmer earns a higher incentive payment by getting a higher price for his wool, a spokesman explained.

College credit courses are made available throughout the state by the Oregon state system of higher education's general extension division, and credit earned is acceptable at all state system campus institutions and elsewhere subject to individual campus requirements.

Noncredit Basis
Students not working toward college degrees may wish to register on a non-credit basis. Fees for both credit and noncredit enrollments are at the rate of \$10.50 per credit hour or \$31.50 for a three-credit hour course. Registrations may be completed at the first or second class meeting. It is not necessary to register in advance.
