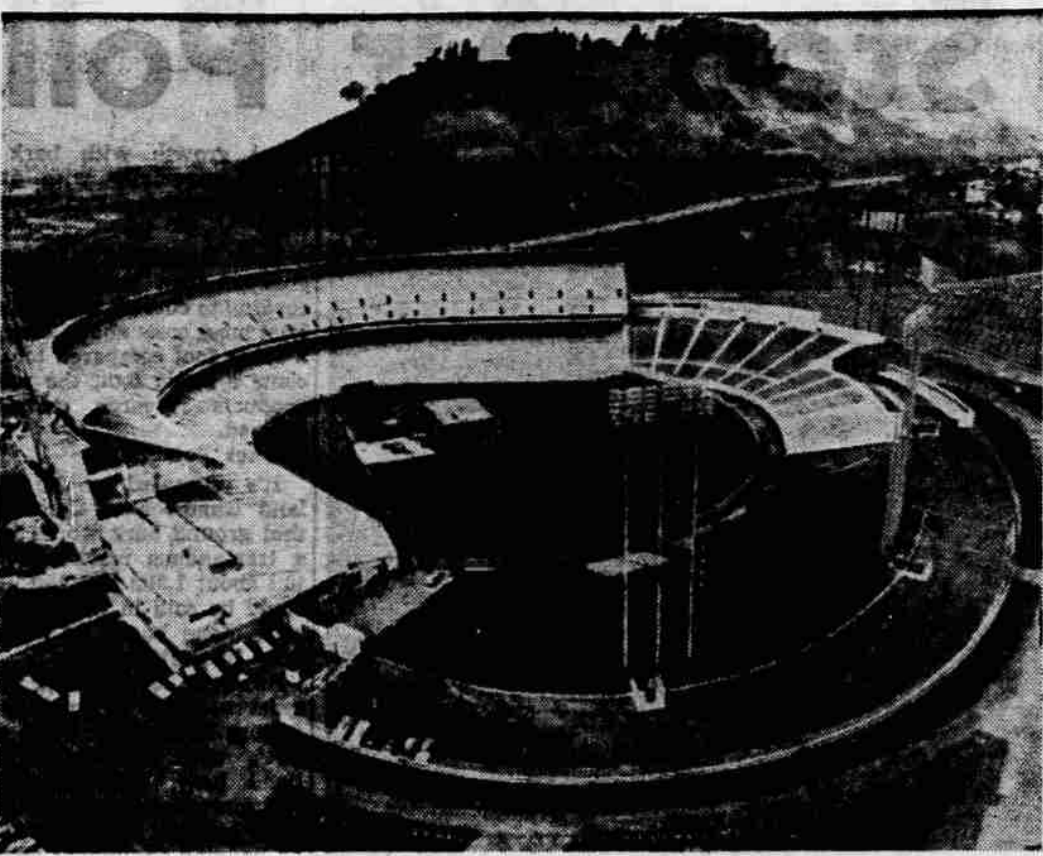

Ashland — University of Oregon swept a doubleheader here Friday afternoon to spoil the 1960 baseball debut of the Southern Oregon college Red Raiders. Scores were 3 to 2 and 14 to 2.

Southern Oregon made a battle of it in the early part of the second game but the Ducks broke a 1-all knot with four markers in the fourth inning and pushed over eight in the sixth. In the first mix the Raiders were down 3 to 0 going into the seventh and final inning but managed to get across a couple of runs.

Oregon opened the scoring in the first mix with a run in the fifth frame on a walk, a stolen base and a single by Jim Hollister. A hit and three errors got the two tallies in the sixth.

Rossetto Triples

Damien Rossetto and Eldon Francis scored the two tallies for the Raiders. Phil Sword singled across Rossetto who had tripled. Francis, in the meantime had gotten on base on a deep grounder to short. He scored on Kermit McLemore's sacrifice fly.

Bob Elliott Concedes KC Has No Title Potential; Hopes for Fifth Place

(This is the fifth in a series of the 1960 prospects of the major league clubs.)

West Palm Beach, Fla. — (UPI) — Even Bob Elliott, the newest manager in the major leagues, concedes his Kansas City Athletics have no pennant potential.

"He's hoping to finish fifth. 'We aren't ready to take on the big guys,' Elliott said frankly. And by the big guys he meant the White Sox, Indians, Yankees, and Tigers.

"We could beat the rest of them," he predicted, but not with too much enthusiasm. That's because he has infield and pitching problems.

The key to his ball club, as he sees it, is shortstop.

Elliott hopes rookie Ken Hamlin can do the job and if the 23-year-old Detroit native can, the Athletics will be in a much better position to make that assault on fifth place.

Hamlin batted .251 with Columbus of the International League, hitting 10 homers and driving in 69 runs.

Can Switch Lumps

Should the youngster fail to measure up, Elliott will have to switch Jerry Lumpe from second base to shortstop.

"I'd rather have Lumpe at second because he prefers to play there and I think that's his best position," Elliott says. "Whether or not he remains on second at all depends on Hamlin."
