Sweetland, Appling Exchange Blasts

The two chief rivals for election as secretary of state in November, Democrat Monroe Sweetland and Republican Howell Appling Jr., traded verbal blasts Friday night.

Sweetland told a Democratic meeting in Portland that Appling, the incumbent, arranged a "phony economy stunt" in cancelling Oregon's membership in the National Association of Secretaries of State.

He said one of his first moves if elected would be to restore Oregon's membership "as a sound investment in good government." He said Oregon's annual dues are \$100.

In Salem, Appling wrote off Sweetland's blast as "shrill, politically-motivated noises."

Commission Adopts Long-Range Plans

Portland — (UPI) — The state public welfare commission Friday adopted a long-range program which it hopes will bring an end to serious problems of public assistance to families.

The board will seek to solve the problems of dependent families by planned cooperation of community agencies. Such agencies would include juvenile courts, community councils, child guidance clinics and other child and family service groups.

The staff was authorized to explore the availability of private foundation funds to aid in financing. Monies also are authorized for use in getting consultants from other communities and other agencies.

Adenauer Issues Challenge to Reds

Tokyo — (UPI) — West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer challenged the Soviet Union Saturday to accept President Eisenhower's "open skies" air inspection plan to prove that Russia is serious about nuclear disarmament.

"It requires only a yes or no answer," the touring Chancellor told a stormy news conference during which millions of TV viewers saw the 84-year-old Adenauer snap irritably at photographers and newsmen.

The West German leader, beginning to show the strain of his long tour of the United States and Japan, appeared before a standing-room only audience of newsmen after a two-hour talk with Japanese Premier Nobusuke Kishi.

Straub and Gunnar In Public Debate

Salem — (UPI) — Oregon Democratic Party Chairman Robert W. Straub and Oregon Republican Chairman Peter M. Gunnar in a public debate here Friday night discussed their jobs as party chairman, campaign issues and philosophy of the two political parties.

Specifically Gunnar attacked the Democrats' plan to give cash credits and awards in their voter registration drive and Straub directed much of his criticism to Gov. Mark Hatfield. They addressed an audience of about 125 persons for about two hours in Waller auditorium at Willamette university.

Mark Says Demos Will Name Adlai

Chicago — (UPI) — The Democratic convention at Los Angeles will nominate Adlai E. Stevenson for a third try at the presidency, Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield predicted Friday.

Hatfield, a Republican, said the twice-defeated Democratic candidate would be nominated again to oppose Vice President Richard M. Nixon in the November elections.

Committeeman Lists Negligence Charge

Troutdale — (UPI) — A member of the legislative interim committee on taxation charged today Oregon insurance commissioners have been "negligent" in failing to impose retaliatory provisions of the state's insurance law. He added it may be costing the state millions.

State Rep. Vernon Cook (D-Troutdale) said he had an opinion from Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton to back up his stand. He charged that the present insurance commissioner, Dwean Musser, and his predecessors for 13 years have failed to impose retaliatory provisions.

New Jersey Paper Files Damage Suit

Newark, N.J. — (UPI) — The Newark Star-Ledger, a member of the Newhouse newspaper group, filed a \$6 million damage suit Friday in a Federal Court here against six unions, charging them with conspiracy to take retaliatory action to support strikers at Portland newspapers.

The complaint charged that the defendants conspired by "threats and other affirmative acts to engage in a strike, slowdown, work stoppage and other actions in order to interfere with the normal publication and distribution" of the Star-Ledger.

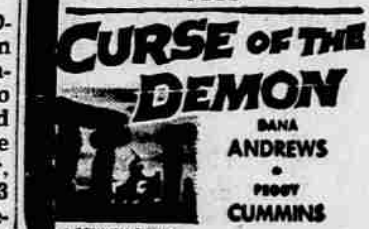
