## Mrs. K. Tours Famous Louvre In 40 Minutes

Paris-UPI-Mrs. Nina Khrushchev, 59, today set a new unofficial speed record for "doing" the Louvre, one of the most famed art museums in the world.

She did it reluctantly. Louvre guides recalled the pre-war exploits of a group of American tourists, who whisked through the rambling museum in 42 minutes.

Mrs. Khrushchev did it today in a brisk 40 minutes, mostly because her hosts noted she was behind schedule. They took her by the elbow for only brief glimpses of the Venus de Milo, the headless Wing Victory of Samothrace, and hundreds of other art treasures.

Following rapidly behind Mrs. Khrushchev were her daughters, Julie, Rada and Elena.

Protocol officials and museum guides allowed Mrs. Khrushchev to stop momentarily before the Winged Victory, but she upset all their plans and suddenly darted off into another room. Naturally, everybody had to follow.

The wife of the Soviet Premier seemed particularly interested in a giant alabaster vase in the room, so Louis Jaujard, secretary general of the French Ministry of Fine Arts, invited her to say something into it.

"Hou-hou," said Nina, and from the vase's companion piece came a "hou hou" echo. Nina looked surprised and pleased.

Then the almost-running tour of the Louvre continued. Mrs. Khrushchev could only turn her head quickly from side to side, as though she were watching a tennis match, to take in some of the grandeur.

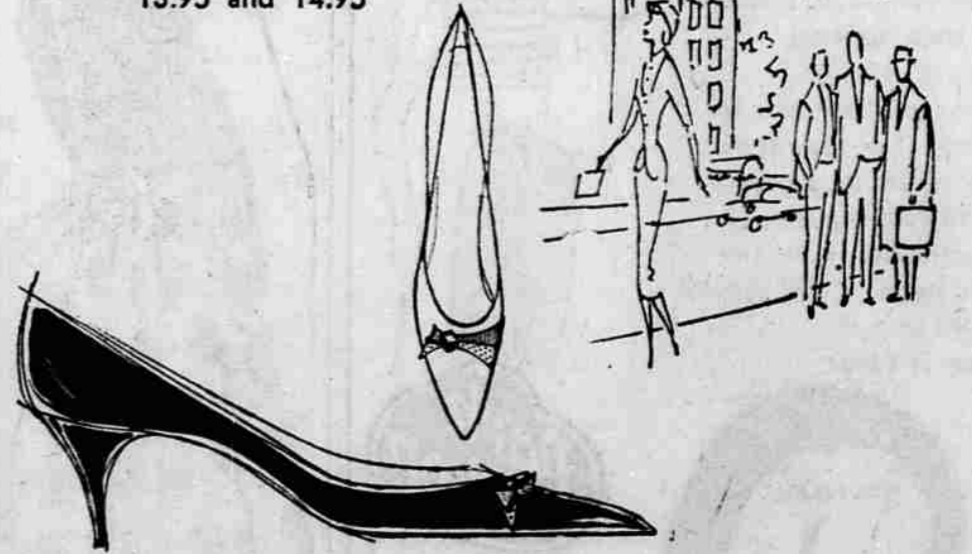
