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### Undesirable Literature Washington PTA Topic

A panel discussion on undesirable literature was held during a meeting of Washington Parent-Teachers association Thursday night at the school.

On the panel were Paul Haviland, Medford lawyer; the Rev. John Reynolds, pastor of Westminster Presbyterian church, and Mrs. Kay Crowell, Jackson County juvenile officer. The speakers were introduced by Mrs. Thomas Antley.

Mr. Reynolds stated that our "thought life" can never be divorced from our "act life." He quoted the Scripture verse "as a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." Churches are lagging behind in eradication of undesirable literature, he stated, and each church should be working strongly so

the church's voice could be heard.

Mrs. Crowell said that she is often asked, "How much juvenile delinquency is really caused by undesirable literature and television programs?" A mature adult does not purchase this literature, she said. Many children will and then discuss it with others, often leading them into trouble. Comic books are often damaging, the speaker said, and it is very important for an adult to help the child distinguish the good from the bad.

Outlook and Education  
Mr. Haviland explained that if young people are expected to have the right kind of outlook, they must have the right kind of education. Most people do not realize the seriousness and extent of the problem.

He suggested that each individual go to the merchant and mention the condition of his magazine rack, whether it be good or bad. If the rack contains undesirable literature, Mr. Haviland said to tell the merchant to either clean it up or you will take your business elsewhere and other friends will be notified.

He stated that through the PTA steps were being taken in the county to control obscene literature.

A question and answer period followed the panel discussion.
