## Settlement School Is Topic of Club Program

A program on Pi Beta Phi Settlement school will be presented at a meeting of the Medford Pi Beta Phi Alumnae club on Wednesday, March 30, at 8 p.m. The meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. Houston L. Bush Jr., 118 Black Oak drive.

Miss Gennie Kent, an Ashland teacher and native of Tennessee, will talk to the group about the Settlement school and that part of the Great Smoky mountains around Gatlinburg, Tenn., where the school is located. Miss Kent, who is descended from the first Presbyterian minister in Knoxville, Tenn., has spent many summers in the mountain area of Gatlinburg.

Pi Beta Phi Settlement school was established by the national social sorority in 1912 and was the first philanthropic project among fraternity women. At that time there were 13 students in the school; today it has an enrollment exceeding 500, and 13 buildings. The county has taken over support of the basic educational program, but Pi Beta Phi provides additional teachers to supplement the basic curriculum.

In addition to the full 12-year school, Pi Beta Phi provides a Health center and has promoted a revival of handicrafts in the southern highlands area. Craft articles, particularly woven items, are produced in the homes of the mountain people and marketed by Pi Beta Phi under the trade mark Arrowcraft.
