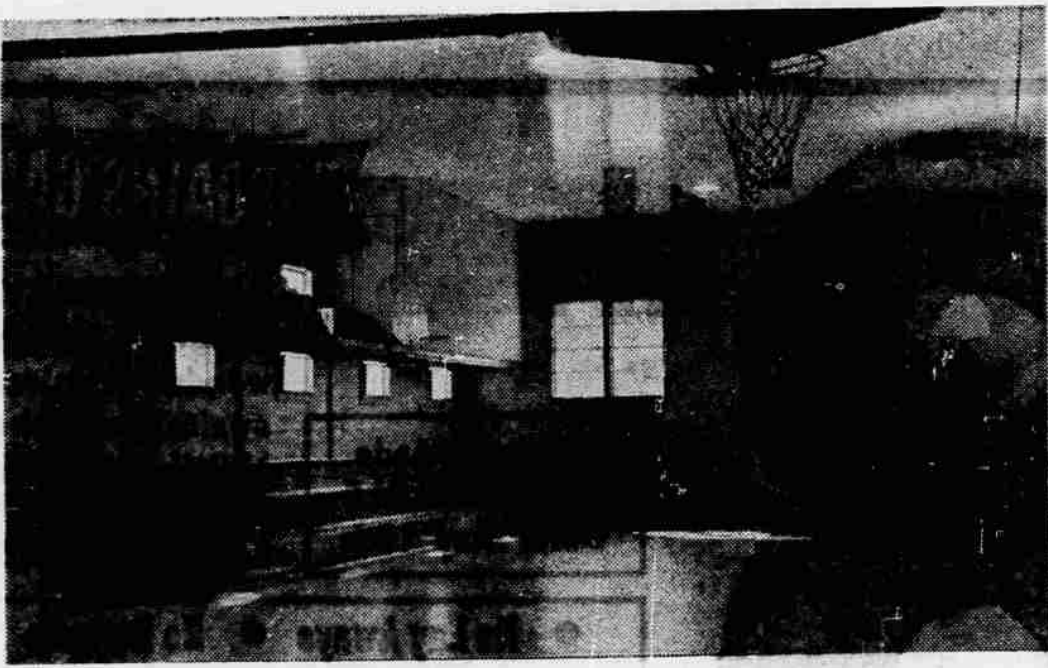

school district bond issue is reviewed. Today's article concerns long-range building plans of the district, and why the bond issue does not include planning for more than two years.)

To determine long-range building needs for School District 549C, several factors are considered by district officials. The \$750,000 bond issue on which district patrons will vote Thursday, March 31, is for building needs for the next two years, with those facilities necessary for the 1960-61 school year being constructed first.

Because of population trends, and consideration of other factors, long-range plans are subject to revision periodically. Among factors involved in long-range planning for district 549C are:

1. Whether Medford's education program is extended in scope to include kindergarten and vocational pre-school facilities, and/or post-high school facilities, such as a junior college.
2. If a second high school is constructed, how each will be used. For example, if a four-year high school is more advantageous, the need for an additional junior high school will be postponed for a number of years. The high school now is a three-year operation, that is for grades 10 through 12. A four-year high school would be for grades 9 through 12, leaving only the seventh and eighth grades in junior high.

3. Location of housing developments. The only two large areas at present in district 549C, where sizable housing projects may start, school district officials noted, appear to be between Griffin Creek and the Washington-Jefferson-Oak Grove schools' attendance areas.

Preliminary surveys do not indicate any large scale home construction program in these areas at this time, officials noted. But if such a program develops, a new school may have to be constructed in each locality at some undetermined date.

Projected Home Building
Present projected home building appears to be in the Hoover, Wilson, Jefferson and West Side areas, where classroom needs can be met by additional rooms at the respective schools, officials pointed out.

4. The time for the need of an additional high school will depend on maximum enrollment in the junior and high school age group during the next few years, school officials said. At this time, they said, it appears that need for a new high school will be 1964 or 1965.

Additional growth of the district is evident, administrators noted. For the first time in the history of Medford schools, there are more than 600 students enrolled in several grades. This year, 435 students will graduate from high school. A total of 771 students were enrolled in the first grade this year, 336 more than will be graduated.

Enrollment to Increase
Based on children now living in the district, enrollment in Medford schools may increase in five years from 7,646
