Cataracts in the Eyes

I hate to be writing so often on cataracts, but I feel I should because in my mail I get so many letters from older persons begging for information on this subject. Usually, the first big question is, should the person try some quack's remedy to be taken by mouth or some eye drops he has read about somewhere? The answer is "No"; there is only one treatment for cataracts, and that is an operation. The second question usually is, should one cataract be removed when the sight in the other eye is good? As some persons write: they saw four ophthalmologists and three refused to operate, saying it would do no good, because after operation the two eyes would not work together (unless perhaps with the help of a contact lens); but one man was keen to operate.

Whom should they believe? I wish they could read a stack of letters I have received from persons who had one cataract removed, and now are sorry because they cannot read without perhaps covering up one eye. Some eye men operate as soon as sight begins to fail definitely in the good eye. They do not fit a lens in front of the operated eye until the person needs to use that eye.

Another question from spry old people of 80 is: "should I insist on having the operation?" My children keep discouraging me, saying I am too old." My answer is, "If you are too blind to read, and if you can find an eye specialist who will operate, go ahead. There is almost no shock to a cataract operation. It is done under local anesthesia and it takes only a few minutes. I am told that many able eye-doctors are now letting the patient get up soon after the operation, and this helps a lot.

Usually, when both eyes have cataracts, the doctor operates on one eye at a time. In most cases the result is good; the person can read again, or at least can get about again. In cases of doubt, the patient should talk to three or four of the leading eye men in his city. This is cheaper than traveling about to other cities.

Need for Electroencephalograms

Many a mother writes to say that she is frantic over the illness of a boy who is perhaps delinquent, or violent in his rages, or unable to read well, or unable to get along at school, or who has curious momentary "dumb spells," or curious tizzies, or who is being treated by a child psychiatrist. Some times the mother is intelligent enough to say that she wonders if the boy has a "touch of epilepsy" such as his Uncle Bill had, or she wonders if his "orneriness" is due to the brain fever he had after an awful attack of measles.

I agree entirely with the mother, and I marvel at the occasional psychiatrist who will treat such a boy for months or years without getting electroencephalograms made. Often when these rec-

Submarine Fires

Regulus Missile

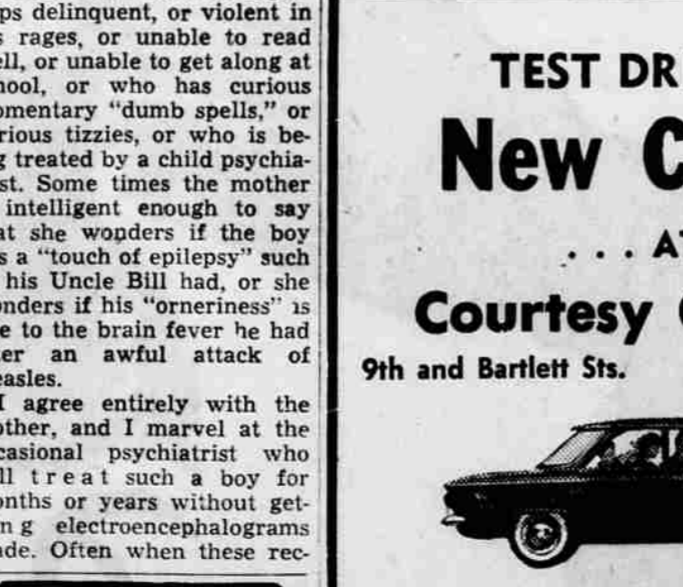
Honolulu—(UPI)—The Halibut became the first American nuclear submarine to fire a guided missile from its deck when it launched a Regulus I missile Friday near Hawaii.

A Navy spokesman said Monday the Regulus was guided by four Navy chase planes and landed at Bonham Naval Air Facility on the island of Kauai after a 15-minute flight of 140 miles.

The Halibut fired its first Regulus within four days after reporting for operational duty with the Pacific Fleet. The Halibut is the only nuclear submarine equipped to handle deck firings of Regulus I and Regulus II missiles while surfaced. Other nuclear subs under construction are being equipped to fire Polaris type missiles from beneath the surface.

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Shirley Field Raps Republicans

Oregon City—(UPI)—Rep. Shirley Field (R-Portland) Monday night charged Republicans in Oregon with lack of foresight and planning in the operation of the party.

Miss Field, a candidate for the Republican nomination for state treasurer, spoke to Young Republicans from Clackamas county here.

"When prominent Democrats point out to us that they are concerned for the outlook for a strong two-party system here because of the lack of Republican candidates, it's about time we woke up," Miss Field said.

"Too many Republicans won't take an active part. All they'll do is complain. Instead of sitting around and gnashing our teeth about what the Democrats are doing, let's get on with the job," she said.

Talk Slated on Insurance Taxes

Salem—(UPI)—Insurance Commissioner V. Dean Musser said Monday night a consultation was planned today with a representative of Gov. Mark Hatfield and other state officials concerning a charge by State Rep. Vern Cook (D-Troutdale) that the state could have collected many more millions of dollars in taxes over the past 13 years from out-of-state insurance companies.

Musser, Secretary of State Howard Appling Jr., and a representative of the attorney general's office conferred on the matter Monday but Musser said no decision was reached.
