# 'Finest Squad I've Ever Had,' Joe Gordon Says Of Cleveland's Indians

(This is the eighth of 18 dispatches on the 1960 prospects of the major league teams.)

By DAVE ROWE Tucson, Ariz. - (UPI) - With Frank (Trader) Lane at the controls, the Cleveland Indians' lineup always is subject to change without notice.

Manager Joe Gordon, who was out and then in again through Lane's revolving door last fall, believes he now has "the finest squad I've ever had."

That could well mean the pennant, for the Indians missed by only five games last season. The big question is whether Lane's infield juggling has strengthened the team enough to make up for the loss of 19-game winner Cal McLish.

McLish, the Tribe's top winner, went to the Cincinnati Reds in the big winter deal for second baseman Johnny Temple.

Call Infield Best "I wouldn't trade my infield for anything," said Gordon. "It's a good hitting group, it has power, balance, speed, and defensive strength."

Temple, replacing the volatile Billy Martin at second, is perhaps the key man. He swung a .311 bat for the Reds last year where he also teamed with shortstop Roy McMillan for one of the finest key-stone combinations in baseball.

The Indians had only one regular over .300 last year. They hope Temple's hitting

will pep up the attack and that his fielding will give the defense consistency.

Held fanned 110 times last year and Gordon says, "if he cuts that in half, he's bound to boost his batting average."

With McLish gone, the Indians look to young pitchers to show the way - men like 16-game winner Gary Bell, 12-game winner Jim Perry and 10 - game winner Jim (Mudcat) Grant.

Other mound prospects are Bob Lemon, who has lost 18 pounds in his determination for a come-back; Bob Tiefenauer, out with arm trouble last year; Jack Harshman, and rookies Johnny Briggs, Wynn Hawkins and Don Schaeffer.

The outfield has co-home run champion Rocky Colavito in right and Tito Francona, a surprise with his .363 mark last year, in left. Center is open with veteran Jim Piersall and rookie Carroll Hardy competing for the job.

Lane thought he had obtained Sammy White from the Red Sox as his No. 1 catcher, but then White quit baseball and Commissioner Ford Frick voided the deal.

Gordon sums up this way: "If our young pitchers come through we will give all clubs a run for their money. We are aiming for the top and I can see no reason why we won't be there at the end of the season."

# LA Dodgers Surge Back For Two Straight Wins

By JOHN GRIFFIN United Press International The champ was in trouble, but a sudden left-right "one-two" punch - Johnny Podres and Don Drysdale - has everything okay again.

The world champion Los Angeles Dodgers were staggering just two days ago with four straight exhibition losses.

As a result, the Dodgers are back at the .500 mark in the Grapefruit league with seven wins and seven losses and are starting to feel better about their chances of repeating.

Drysdale worked seven innings of Tuesday's victory and allowed only two hits. He fanned eight, walked none, and let only one runner reach second. The National League strikeout king now has pitched 19 innings this spring and has been scored on in only two of them.

The defeat snapped a five-game Card winning streak. Pacing the champs' 10-hit attack were ex-Card Wally Moon with a double and a triple and Don Zimmer with two doubles.

Zimmer had been reported on the trading block - and so has Roy Sievers, the Washington Senators' slugger who belted two homers in Tuesday's 5-4 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

Green, one of the NBA's "little" players at 6 feet 2 inches, was the spark Tuesday night that enabled the Hawks to bare their talons for a 113-103 victory over the Celtics at the Garden.
