Carnegie Awards Education Grants

New York - UPI - The Carnegie Corporation of New York has announced grants totalling nearly \$1,500,000 for educational purposes.

The largest grant - \$500,000 over a five-year period - went to the Council of Foreign Relations for research and study programs.

The President's Commission on National Goals will receive partial support through a grant of \$100,000 to the American Assembly, which holds meetings on subjects of national importance.

The Carnegie Corporation, founded in 1911 by the late Andrew Carnegie for the advancement of knowledge, has total assets valued at about \$200 million.
