

### New Tools for Water Pollution Fight Said Needed

Washington—(Science Service)—America is fighting a losing battle in trying to meet today's mounting water pollution problems with outdated equipment, a government report discloses.

It shows that the total combined national expenditure for water pollution research is now running less than \$6 million a year. Less than one-third of this is spent by the U. S. Government. The special report was filed by the public health service with the Senate select committee on national water resources.

"It is obvious," said Gen. Robert S. Kerr (D-Okla.), committee chairman, "that a country spending over \$1.5 billion per year on 'soap operas' and other forms of TV and radio entertainment should invest much more than \$6 million annually to find how to keep these fine new products of our soap factories and other chemicals from spoiling our drinking water."

**Planning Urged**  
 In addition to scientific research, the PHS report urges:  
 1. Nation-wide planning of water quality control programs for river basins at a rate up to \$8 million a year.  
 2. Collection of data on sources, strength, volume and hazards of all types of pollution.

3. Construction of the \$4.6 billion unbuilt backlog of remedial works needed to use the best methods now available to clean up water sources in the next five years.  
 4. Better enforcement of state and federal anti-pollution laws.

5. Legislation to meet new pollution problems, and action to establish wider public understanding of the pollution problem.

### People Marrying Earlier, Having More Children

Washington - (UPI) - Marriage, long a popular institution, is becoming more so, according to an expert on family living.

Dr. Reuben Hill, professor of sociology and director of the University of Minnesota's Family Study Center, says "people are marrying earlier, having more children, spacing them closer together, and probably enjoying them more."

This is a more stimulating climate for children to grow up in, he told the White House Conference on Youth and Children.

**Trends Listed**  
 Hill listed these trends:  
 -People are marrying earlier, with high school and college marriages much more common.

-More people are married at every age, fewer bachelors and spinsters are left in the population, marriage as a status is highly prized.

-Although in long-term perspective divorce rates have been climbing since the Civil War, divorces have been declining since 1946. Divorces are found most frequently among grammar school educated, working classes, -veterans, and teen-agers.

-Completed family size has been declining since 1700 when it was 7.4 children, to 2.5 children in 1950, but a reversal of this 250-year trend is in the making. More people, such as white collar, professionals and college-educated persons are having more children.

**Children Spaced Closer**  
 -Closely related to family size is the trend to space children closer together.

-Will said these trends have considerable meaning for the husband-wife and the parent-child relationship. Among these are: Marriage is less of an economic burden for the husband, because the wife can work before the children come and after they are in school; when several children live together, they tend to break away from the family more easily when the time comes for them to do so; and in large families no one will feel isolated.

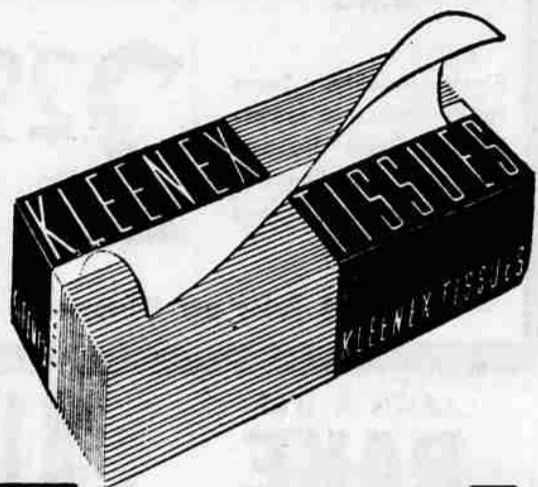
Next day he found a Biblical scholar had added: "The Lord Blesseth Those Who Help Themselves."

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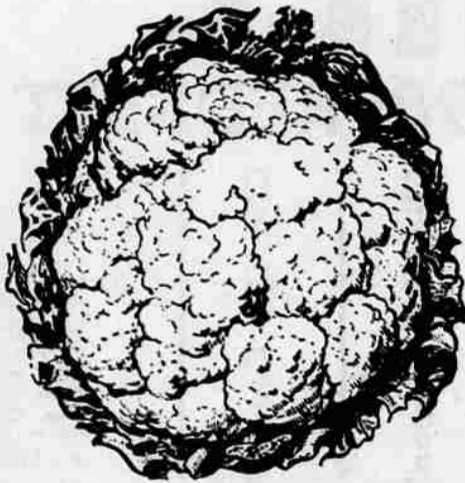


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
