Getting Rid of Tapeworm

A few people keep asking me how to get rid of the head of a tapeworm. Many years ago I had a considerable experience with people with these worms, and finally I learned what the secret of getting the head is. One must get the head, or the worm grows again. Most of the books say: "Give the patient a purgative the night before you are going to give the worm medicine," but there is where the mistake is made. In the first place, there is no conceivable reason for giving that first "cleansing" purge because a man's small bowel (where the worm is) is always empty in the morning. It does not need to be emptied. But that first purge wrecks the success of the procedure. Perhaps it warns the worm to dig in and hold on tight, or it interferes with the quick and efficient action of the second purge which is given to crush the worm out while he is ruffled with the anti-worm drug.

No More Patients

After I discovered this secret I was interested to find that it was well known to the old German doctors who had many tapeworms to remove, and I was even more interested to find that the traveling non-medical "tapeworm specialists" also know what the trick is.

I don't see people with tapeworms any more, now that the carcasses of cattle and hogs are well inspected. If I did see any, I would like to try the "root-beer cure." Years ago I had a prospector with a tapeworm that no doctor had ever been able to dislodge. One day he came in with a grin to tell me that, on coming in off the desert, frantic for fuel, he had bought a small barrel of ice-cold root beer and had drunk most of it right down. Shortly after this, the whole worm meekly crawled out; he evidently did not like some constituent of the root beer! Perhaps some drug chemist can find out what it was.

Psychiatric Help for Employees

I was just reading that four New York firms have contracted with Mt. Sinai hospital to provide psychiatric help for some of the firm's employees. The doctors will help employees who are facing psychological problems; they will help people worried about retiring; they will do something which should certainly have been done long ago, and this is to see if the results of psychological tests given to applicants for employment really did throw light on the later performance and success of the person. Very good is the firm's plan to help those of their employees who are having serious troubles with alcoholism.

Sun Can Be Used To Relay Messages

New York—(Science Service) The sun could be used to relay radio messages between distant points on earth, a scientist at the international convention of the Institute of Radio Engineers here recently.

Donald J. Blattner of the RCA laboratories at Princeton, N.J., said radar pulses bounced from the sun demonstrate that the sun's gases could also reflect coded radio signals.

He said the system is technically feasible and may some day be justified by the growing demand for more communication channels. It could be especially useful when the moon is not in position to serve as a reflector for radio signals. The solar method would require large antennas, a transmitter with a power output of a million watts and electronic data-handling equipment.

Regular Check-ups Reveal Diseases

Philadelphia—(Science Service)—Regular physical check-ups reveal some previously unrecognized disease in one-fourth to one-third of supposedly healthy adults, a physician reported here.

In about half these cases the patient has not experienced any symptoms of the disease in question, Dr. Norbert J. Roberts, associate medical director of Standard Oil of New Jersey, told the American Academy of General Practice here.

Fifteen to 20 per cent of patients examined periodically, he added, need medical observation or treatment for disease or defects that were previously known to exist.

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Drunk Drivers Take Hikes in Turkey

Boston—UPI—Turkey has devised an effective system for dealing with drinking drivers, reports the Automobile Legal association.

While Turkish traffic officers stop a motorist who has been tipping, they take him for a little ride. When about 15 miles from his car, they tell him to get out and walk back. To keep him honest, the officers ride slowly along behind him all the way back.
