Applegate District Rangers Begin Many Spring Projects

Applegate Valley - A broad scope of spring field work is shaping up for the Applegate ranger district, and at present crews are in the midst of planting 100,000 trees over

nearly 200 acres, according to Neil Suttell, district ranger. These figures also include fall plantings.

Other projects starting include stand improvement work with thinning and shaping of young trees in the

logged areas, roadside stabilization by mulching, range seeding, and piling and burning of slash. Road and trail maintenance will be started soon, as well as location surveys for road construction.

Joe Jewell, who has had three years of duty with the Modoc National forest in California, has joined the staff at Star Ranger station as scaler and project forester in charge of technical aspects of timber stand improvement. Jewell resides in Medford.
