

Solon Wants To Delete All Bomarc Funds From Budget

Washington (AP)—Rep. Daniel J. Flood says that congress ought to delete every penny for buying Bomarc anti-aircraft missiles from President Eisenhower's budget. The Pennsylvania Democrat, a member of the house defense appropriations subcommittee, said the \$50 million which remains in the president's military appropriation request for next fiscal year to buy the Bomarc should be knocked out. "There are too many other places where we can use this money," Flood told a reporter.

Slash Announced
The air force has announced plans to slash the Bomarc program for the year beginning July 1 from \$420 million to \$50 million. The money taken from Bomarc will be shifted to help speed up the Atlas missile and military satellite projects.

The Bomarc slash represented a belief that Russian missiles represent a greater future threat than Soviet bombers. Flood said in an interview that the only thing that surprised him about the decision was that it wasn't reached long ago.

"The Bomarc is ineffective and obsolescent now, and it will be obsolete on the day it is operational after the air force has spent three billion dollars on it," he said.

He said the Bomarc A, which has a range of 200 miles, is "utterly useless." Flood compared it to a "slingshot with lace curtains."

All Tests Flops
The more advanced Bomarc B, which is designed for a 400-mile range, has been test-fired 11 times "and all have been flops," Flood said.

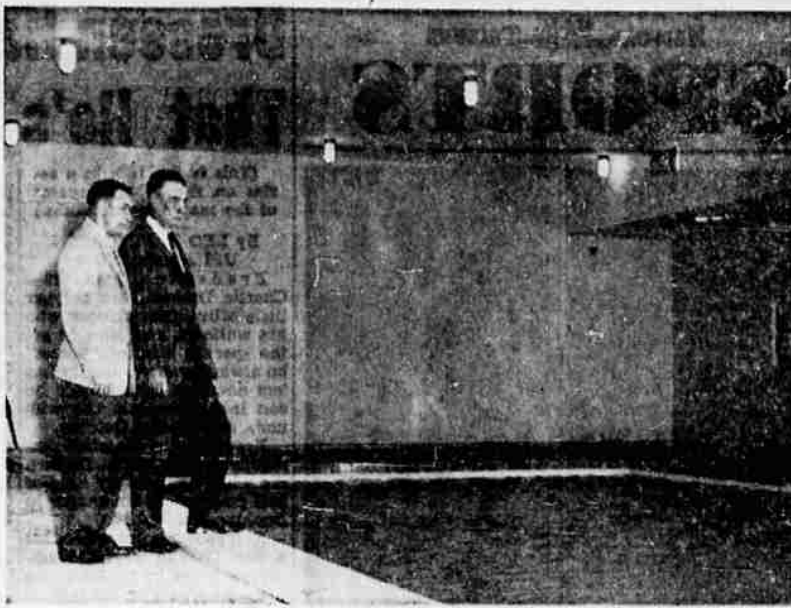
Flood said the huge sums spent on the project appear to have been of no benefit to anyone except the Boeing Airplane Co., the Bomarc contractor, and its stockholders. The value of the Bomarc system has been challenged frequently by Flood and other congressmen. The house defense appropriations subcommittee last year trimmed the request for Bomarc procurement money from nearly \$363 million to \$200 million.

Rep. William E. Minshall (R-Ohio), who called the program a "billion-dollar boondoggle," tried to knock out the remaining \$200 million on the house floor last year but failed 178-51.

Some Leaders Fear Bomber Defense Not Sufficient

Washington (AP)—Some military leaders fear the nation's defenses against Russian bombers may fall apart, defense department officials have admitted.

This was brought out when the officials were questioned about the continuing shift of emphasis to missiles and missile defenses, a development that has cut heavily into the U.S. anti-bomber programs. The military leaders are not certain the Soviet Union intends to rely solely on intercontinental ballistic missiles in event of war. They cite intelligence reports that the Russians are building a huge, 1,300-mile-an-hour commercial transport called the "Boulder".

They say this is far ahead of anything the United States has and may as well be considered a bomber, especially if U. S. air defenses are inadequate.

Fleet Small
The Soviets already have an estimated 150 B-52 intercontinental jet bombers. Although the fleet is small compared to America's 500 B-52s, officials point out that any one of the planes can transport more explosive power than was carried by all the bombers of World War II.

The latest air defense cutbacks Friday took more than \$300 million from the Bomarc anti-aircraft missile and \$275 million from the "SAGE" electronic anti-bomber system. Earlier, the air force cancelled the F-108 supersonic fighter plane, on which \$150 million had been spent.

America's active programs contain nothing remotely comparable to the "Boulder" which, if successful, could give the Soviets a sensational advantage in civilian transport as well as the makings of a military advantage if manned bombers turn out to be important.

Program Continued
The U. S. air force is continuing its program for the B-58 supersonic bomber, which for short distances could match the Bounder's reported 1,300 mile-an-hour speed.

The first B-58's are to become operational this year. The air force is planning to organize three wings with 45 planes each. The B-58, however, is a small bomber—180,000 pounds compared to 400,000 pounds for the B-52—and in addition is supersonic only for short distances, having been designed to cruise at subsonic speeds.

Wall Street Chatter

New York (AP)—The urge to buy "recession-proof" stocks rather than those that seem to move in cycles is just a temporary development that could correct itself if the economy once again enters a major upswing, says Eldon A. Grimm of Walston & Co.

"Undoubtedly, if a new bull market should develop in cyclical issues such as steels, motors, coppers, rails and chemicals, then a lot of the 'sore' money will come out hiding," he maintains.

Grimm says two factors indicate there's a good chance for an upswing later this year—one is the Republicans will have to make things hum if they want to win in November, and the other is we can't afford a recession in the survival race with Russia, whose economy now is going full steam ahead.

Some of the growth stocks which have already made progress in the current market and which are selling at high prices—earnings ratios, have maintained their prices remarkably well during the 1960 selling, according to Gerald M. Loeb of E. F. Hutton & Co.

Waldo M. Allen of Mitchell, Hutchins & Co. says the present performance of the utility average gives no indication of a weakening in industrial activity.
