Portland - The Portland Junior Symphony association announces that Jacob Avshalomov, permanent conductor of the nationally famous 80-member youth orchestra, has been granted a sabbatical leave for the 1960-61 season.

Donald Thulean, dean of the School of Music at Pacific University, Forest Grove, has been selected to conduct the orchestra during Mr. Avshalomov's absence.

Mr. Avshalomov and his family plan to spend the year in Rome, where he will work on his own compositions. Director Thulean was graduated from the University of Washington in 1950, and received his master's degree in music in 1952. He has done professional work in New

York City, and was made a member of the faculty of the Aspen Music School in 1958. His appointment to the Pacific university faculty came in 1955.

During the season Director Thulean will continue at Pacific University on a part time teaching basis.
