Applegate Farm Bureau Opposed To Tags for Dogs

Applegate Valley—Opposition to stock dogs wearing dog license tags was expressed at the meeting of the Applegate farm bureau held at the home of Marlin Grier, president, last Tuesday evening.

In view of the fact that several stock dogs have been known to become tangled in brush by the tags and to be held there for several days, a committee was named to investigate existing dog license laws, although it was stated that the group is not opposed to paying dog tax.

It also was recommended that the Applegate farm bureau support revision of the milk usage law originating in Josephine county, which was presented to the local group by A. L. Lemley of Valley View, Oregon farm bureau insurance representative, who also spoke on advantages and savings in farm bureau insurance.

Lewis Buckley was appointed secretary and treasurer of the local chapter, and the second Thursday of each month was set as the regular meeting day. The Applegate center was organized last month.

Legislative Power

Edwin Taylor of Central Point, county president, spoke on the legislative power of the organization and pointed out that 85 per cent of farm bureau-supported bills and measures have become laws.

Harlan Cantrill, voting delegate, reported on suggestions which the county farm bureau is supporting, including use of electric sales at all auction yards, savings in buying fertilizer through the farm bureau, general opposition to reorganization law concerning school districts, and support of a general rebate of 60 or 70 per cent of tax on gasoline used on farms, and opposition to stock dogs wearing tags.

It was pointed out that the state and national farm bureau is requesting that members write congressmen opposing federal aid to schools, due to restrictions and government control which it would entail.

Partners Revive Use of Oldtime Shake Shingles

Shady Cove—Trail—The making of shakes for roofing was a profitable business in the early days of the valley since hardly any other type of shingle was used.

Today, however, Waldo Nye of Prospect and Arlen Ragsdale of Eagle Point are believed to be the only makers of shake shingles in Jackson county.

Individual shingles are made from blocks of sugar pine which are split into bolts by means of a rive, a metal tool specifically designed for that work. All blocks are split by hand.

The shingles, usually 32 inches long, 6 inches wide

Purpose of the demonstration was to show irrigation improvements, eliminating the old system of water running from ridges, and lessening the number of ditches used, according to C. W. Jensen, chairman of the board of supervisors of the soil conservation district who directed the meeting.

Clem Ault, conservationist, also attended, and Harlan Cantrill, member of the Applegate soil conservation board, discussed the program with visitors. The John Deere 840 diesel tractor was used and the Hancock land leveler.

The conservation board is interested in demonstrating any conservation practices, and encourages all persons interested to watch further work on the West place during the next few years.

Lions Need Men, Money for Work On Old Cemetery

Phoenix—Men and money are needed to complete the cilmen would work on prepa-project, according to O. E. (Opie) Frazier, Fern Valley rd., committee chairman.
