Cardinals Subdue Yankees Again 6-3

The St. Louis Cardinals had a ball in Florida and no team is happier to see them leave than Casey Stengel's bedraggled New York Yankees.

St. Louis ended the Florida section of its exhibition schedule Sunday by whipping New York, 6-3.

It was the National League club's fifth triumph over the Yankees in six games and left Stengel's lads with one of the poorest records in big league exhibition play, 7-13.

The Cardinals (13-7) boasted the top exhibition record among the 16 major league teams when they left Florida Monday by plane for Arizona to tackle the four big league clubs training in the Southwest.

Ron Kline, the right-hander the Cardinals obtained from the Pittsburgh Pirates, pitched his second complete game of the exhibition competition and the fifth by a St. Louis pitcher when he scattered 10 hits against New York Sunday.

The Cardinals now will test their pitchers against some of the game's best long-ball hitters. They'll face the home-happy San Francisco Giants Tuesday at Phoenix.

The Giants reeled off one of their typical games Sunday when Eddie Bressoud hit two triples and drove in five runs during a nine-run sixth inning to spark a 14-9 triumph over the Chicago Cubs. Willie Mays hit his eighth homer and Orlando Cepeda his sixth of the exhibition season for the Giants. Frank Thomas hit two for the Cubs, another gang of homer hitters who play the Cards next week end.

Bull Goes Route
In other Sunday action, Bob Bull went all the way and allowed only four hits in pitching the Milwaukee Braves to a 3-2 triumph over the Washington Senators, and in a game halted by rain after six innings, Hank Aguirre of the Detroit Tigers limited the Pirates to a single by Danny Kravitz while winning 1-0. It was the sixth consecutive loss for Pittsburgh.

Pumpsie Green's single in the 10th inning gave the Boston Red Sox a 5-4 victory over the Cleveland Indians; the Los Angeles Dodgers and Cincinnati Reds were tied at 4-4 when rain halted play after eight innings; the Baltimore Orioles downed the Kansas City Athletics 5-2, and the Chicago White Sox defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 4-2, in a night game at San Juan, P.R.

Shelby Captures Riverside Prix; Von Dory Killed
Riverside, Calif. — Race driver Carroll Shelby has a Riverside Grand Prix trophy to sit beside his 1959 Le Mans first place cup, but his triumph was dimmed by the death of Argentine champion Count Pedro von Dory.

Shelby, of Dallas, Tex., finished a minute and 12 seconds ahead of defending champion Ken Miles, of North Hollywood, Calif., in the Los Angeles sponsored races Sunday.

About the time his "birdcage" Maserati was getting the checkered flag, Von Dory was being carried from the raceway. He was killed when thrown from his Porsche RS-60 just five laps away from the finish.

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St. Louis Evens NBA Series 2-2

St. Louis, Mo. — (UPI) — The riddle of "what's happening to Bob Cousy?" held all the attention today in the National Basketball association championship playoff between the St. Louis Hawks and Cousy's Boston Celtics.

The Hawks evened the best-of-seven series at 2-2 Sunday, dropping Boston, 106-96, at St. Louis while holding the usually high-scoring Cousy to just one basket in 13 tries.

In all, Cousy now has scored but 17 of 69 field goal attempts in the four game series for a frigid 246 shooting percentage.

"It just seems to be one of those things," Boston coach Red Auerbach said. "The ball simply is not going through the basket for Bob. He certainly is physically fit and all that. It's just not falling in. There doesn't seem much that can be done."

Moves To Boston
The series now is scheduled to move to Boston for the crucial fifth game Tuesday, then return to St. Louis for a sixth game on Thursday. A seventh game, if necessary, would be played in Boston on Saturday.

The Hawks had jumped to an early lead over the Celtics Sunday, outscoring Boston 14-4 in the final four minutes of the first period to take a 28-18 edge at the quarter. By the half, St. Louis had built its edge to 50-39, after earlier leading by 12 points, 40-28.

St. Louis led, 81-63, at the end of the third quarter. Key men in the Hawks' attack were Bob Pettit and Cliff Hagan. Pettit wound up the game's top scorer, with 32, and Hagan added 26.

High for Boston were Bill Sharman and Ramsey, each of whom scored 20.

Skaters Bounce Into Contention

The Leafs, powered by Frank Mahovlich and Bob Pulford, rallied in the final period Sunday night to turn back the Detroit Red Wings, 4-2, and advance to the finals against the National Hockey league defending cup champion Canadiens.

Toronto, which was runner-up to Montreal during the regular season, will oppose the Canadiens at Montreal in a best-of-seven-game series starting Thursday.

COLEMAN TO SUDE
Palm Springs, Calif. — (UPI) — The Seattle Rainiers Saturday acquired Gordon Coleman, slugging first baseman and star prospect of the Cincinnati Reds. Along with Coleman, the Reds sent Wall Craddock, southpaw pitcher with a 13-9 record for Havana last season, and Tom Dotterer, who played for Nashville.

The following is from the "Of Cabbages and Kings" column of J. W. Forrester Jr. in the Pendleton East Oregonian:

"There's an interesting story behind the story about that Marshfield - Medford basketball game of last Saturday night for the state championship."

After World War II, the superintendent of Coos Bay schools, Leonard Mayfield, made it known that he intended to have winning teams at Marshfield High School. His first move was to hire a full staff of coaches, led by Pete Susick in football and Bill Brocher in basketball. The staff was of sufficient size to give elementary school youngsters good coaching in football and basketball fundamentals.

Mr. Mayfield's program soon began to pay off. There followed a string of state championships for the Pirates in football and basketball.

From Coos Bay Mr. Mayfield went to Medford. There he put into operation the program that had been so successful at Marshfield. High School, Medford High School athletics weren't at the low ebb Mr. Mayfield had encountered at Marshfield. Medford track teams were dominating state high school track meets. And Medford basketball teams were getting to the state tournament. But there was much to do, and Mr. Mayfield got it done. The payoff came this school year. Medford High School teams have won state football and basketball championships.

They'll be tough from now on. The Mayfield system is well established in Medford and teams from that city will be hard to handle henceforth."

MEDFORD SYSTEM
It's a real fine tribute. Our Dr. Mayfield is deserving of commendation for the work he's done to enhance the Medford athletic program. And, we are proud of him. At the risk of taking away some credit, which we certainly do not wish to do, we, however, would like to make a point — that the "Medford System" in athletics has been in operation many years. A good many Black Tornado followers would like to think that Mayfield, with his touches and refinements, introduced the local system to Marshfield after his years as high school principal here.

NEW DIAMOND
In a recent Press-Box column in the Ashland Daily Tidings, Glen Prescott reported that at Ashland high school baseball and track will be able to "operate separately and simultaneously without the outfielders getting a javelin caught in the ear or a hurdler getting pulled out of action by a line drive."

The reason is that Ashland has a new baseball diamond and the old baseball area at Walter Phillips field is being converted in to a first track and field installation.

Long wished for, the baseball diamond is in use for this season. It lies in an area bounded by Mountain ave., East Main st., and Lincoln st. The track facility may not be completed for this season and Grizzly thinclads have been working out at the Southern Oregon college oval.

OREGON RECORD
Jerry Stubblefield, an ex-Ashland high tracker, a week ago established a 31-year-old University of Oregon discus record. His 164 feet 8 inches beat the former mark of 160-7/10 by Ed Moeller which in its day was a world record.

SOLO SCOUT
Bill Svilich, whom dyed-in-the-wood Medford baseball fans will remember as business manager of the profes-

sional Medford Dodgers back in 1948, has been hired as a year-around scout for the Sacramento Solons of the Pacific Coast league. He is continuing as a salesman for a men's shop at Sacramento.

PLAYING FOR BEAVERS
Oregon State college baseball statistics, published last week, showed that Ed Reinking, ex-Medford high, had two hits and three runs batted in in 10 times up for the Beavers. He's playing centerfield for OSC. Neil Plumley, another ex-Medfordite, was second in the shot put for Oregon State against Arizona State (Tempe) and third against University of Arizona last week end. His third place put was 50 feet 4 1/2 inches.

LINFIELD STALWART
Fred Herrmann, ex-Crater high, is expected to again carry a heavy part of the baseball pitching load at Linfield college. Take it from Paul Durham, Linfield athletic director, to whom we talked at the state basketball tourney, Herrmann has a tremendous potential.

ALL-OPPONENT CHOICE
Oregon's varsity basketball squad was voting on an all-opponent team and sophomore center Wally Knecht calmly announced, "I think I'll vote for myself." Coach Sievel Belko, a bit puzzled, asked his fun loving rookie, "Why?" Knecht replied with a grin, "It's simple. I played against these guys (Oregon's regulars) more than anybody else and even you said I did a pretty good job."

OLYMPIC HOPES
University of Oregon track coach Bill Bowerman thinks a half dozen of his graduate and undergraduate track stars have a chance to earn a place on the 1960 United States Olympic Games team. Bowerman lists graduate students Bill Dellinger, a veteran of the 1956 games, Jim Grelle in the 880, mile and steeplechase, and Otis Davis (ineligible for further varsity competition because of the five-year rule) in the 400. From his present team Bowerman thinks Dave Edstrom in the decathlon, Daryl Burleson in the 1500 meters and Roscoe Cook in the sprints are strong contenders.

There are also three Ducks, Sig Ohlemann, a sophomore middle distance man, freshman Vic Reeve and freshman sprinter Harry Jerome, who could have a chance to make the Canadian team. "It's a long time between now and the trials," Bowerman pointed out, "and the competition will be very tough. We have every hope, however, that these young men will compete well when the time comes."

AAU Swim Marks Fall

New Haven, Conn. — (UPI) — United States Olympic hopefuls, completing one of the most successful meets in national AAU swimming history, looked forward today to the Detroit trials, Aug. 2-5, and a berth on the squad selected for the summer games in Rome.

Records were shattered in all 14 racing events held during the three-day championship in Yale's Payne Whitney pool.

Most spectacular was the performance of George Harrison, of Stanford, Calif. The 21-year-old swimmer, the top individual scorer with 17 points, set an American record of four minutes, 28.6 seconds for the 400-yard individual medley.

There were three double winners in the meet. Lieut. (j.g.) Jeff Farrell, a Navy officer attending Yale, set American marks of 48.2 seconds in the 100-yard freestyle and 2:00.2 in the 220-yard freestyle; Charles Bittick of Southern California, was 54.5 seconds in the 100-yard backstroke and 2:13.1 in the 220-yard event, and Mike Troy of Bloomington, Ind., was clocked in 53.1 seconds for the 100-yard butterfly and 2:12.4 for the 220-yard distance.

PORTLAND CLUB ACQUIRES MESA
Portland — (UPI) — The Portland Beavers have acquired some added help for their pitching staff.

Former Washington Senator Pete Mesa has been acquired by the Beavers for an undisclosed purchase price.

Mesa is no newcomer to the Pacific Coast league. He played for San Diego in 1957 and for Sacramento in 1958. He was with Washington and Denver last year and had a 7-5 mark.

Pitching Again Problem For Cincinnati Redlegs;

(This is the 12th of 18 dispatches on the 1960 prospects of the major league clubs.)

Tampa, Fla. — (UPI) — Fred Hutchinson, starting his first full season as manager of the Cincinnati Reds, thinks he has everything he needs to win the 1960 National league pennant, "except perhaps pitching."

"We have the power, the speed and the defense it takes, but I wish I felt more secure about my pitching," is the way he analyzed his club today. He agrees that other baseball men could be right when they claim he isn't going to come up with enough pitching.

Pitching has been the Reds' big problem over the years and in an attempt to overcome it they gave up one of the best second basemen in the business, Johnny Temple, to get Cal McLish, a 19-game winner with Cleveland last season. Can't Do It Alone

"But Cal can't do it alone," observed the forthright Hutchinson, who was quite a pitcher in his day.

What has disappointed the Red's plot is the failure of any of his rookie hurlers to do better. That means that besides McLish and Bill Henry, he is going to have to go with almost the same staff he finished last season.

Henry was obtained from the Cubs where he won nine while losing eight, but was impressive in relief.

For starters in addition to McLish he has Bob Purkey (13-18) who has been taking his lumps this spring; Don Newcombe (13-8) whom the hitters claim has lost his stock in trade, the fast ball; and southpaw Joe Nuxhall (9-9).

First Base Problem
Jim Brosnan, who had a combined mark of 9-6 with the Cardinals and Reds in 1959 but did his most impressive hurling for Cincinnati late in the season, has the inside track as the fifth starter.

The Reds may have a first base problem because it doesn't look as if Gordon Coleman, who batted .353 at Mobile last year and then .333 for Cleveland in nine games at the tail-end of the season is

going to make it. Coleman was a part of the Temple-McLish deal.

That means Frank Robinson, who would rather play left field, would have to return to first base. There is an outside chance outfielder Lee Walls, who hit .257 for the Cubs last season, could win the first base job, but he also is being tried at third. At that spot, the Reds have Eddie Kasko and Willie Jones. But neither look good enough for the long haul.

So only two infield spots are certain — Roy McMillan at short and Billy Martin, the ex-American Leaguer, at second.

Nieporte Cops Azalea Tussle
Wilmington, N.C. — (UPI) — Tom Nieporte of Bronxville, N.Y., who led from start to finish in the Azalea open golf tournament, failed to qualify for the Masters tournament next weekend despite his two-stroke victory.

The little-known golfer won his first tournament of the year on the PGA tour Sunday but didn't have enough points to receive a bid for the Augusta, Ga., competition.

Nieporte fired a one-over par 73 for a total of 277.

Gary Brewer of Crystal River, Fla., carved out a 70 Sunday for second place golfer.

Brewer was pushed from second place at the end of the first round by Dow Finsterwald of Tequesta, Fla., who moved ahead of him and threatened to overtake Nieporte. Brewer entered the final round two strokes back of Finsterwald but claimed the second spot when Finsterwald fired a two-over-par 74 for a total of 281 to 279 for Brewer.

Also tied for third place was Don Whitt.

RAINED OUT
Daytona Beach, Fla. — (UPI) — The Salt Lake City Bees of the Pacific Coast league got off to a good start in their exhibition baseball game with the Toronto Maple Leafs Sunday, but they didn't get to finish. The Bees were leading 8-2 when the contest was rained out at the end of three innings.

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
