The team, which also includes four National Industrial Basketball League players and one member of the Armed Forces All-Stars was named Sunday, following the windup of the three-day Olympic trials at the Denver Coliseum.

Boeing To Idle 5,000 Employees

Seattle — (UPI)—Boeing Airplane Co. President William M. Allen Saturday reported that some 5,000 employees will be laid off by the end of 1960. Allen said the layoffs were made necessary by the Air Force recommendation that Boeing Bomarc appropriations be cut. Of the total, 2,700 workers will be removed from jobs on the Bomarc project and others connected indirectly with Bomarc will be laid off, Allen said. Allen indicated the employee layoffs would continue in 1961, but that it was too early yet to tell just how many would be necessary.
