The latest shapes are either fold draped, bias cut or gathered sarong-like from the waistline. Even sheaths, with tiny tucking at the waist, seem to stand out a bit from the hipline... these in poplin, twill and denim.

The "bare" look in bathing suits has gone about as far as it can go. They range from one piece, strapped or strapless to modified two-pieces to the "no-holds-barred" (or bared) bikini. And they run the gamut in cotton both in design and type; everything from dotted swiss to denim.
