Back Stairs: Seed on Fertile Ground

Washington (UPI)—Backstairs at the White House:

The Rev. Billy Graham's suggestion to President Eisenhower last week that the chief executive visit the African country of Nigeria before leaving office might have been seed on fertile ground.

Although Eisenhower has said publicly that there will be little interest in what he does once the presidential election campaign gets under way, he does not plan to sink back into the cushiony oblivion usually reserved for presidents on their way out of office.

He would be careful about doing anything that would interfere with the plans of a new president, but that would not mean necessarily retirement from the international scene.

It does not look now like the President will be able to visit Alaska on his way home from Russia and Japan in late June. He currently is expected to stop in Hawaii for a brief rest. This raises the distinct possibility of a trip to Alaska before he leaves office. The Republicans might like the idea of an Eisenhower speech from the 49th state during the campaign.

Eisenhower's next trip: To the Augusta, Ga. National Golf Club next week for about 10 days. During his golfing holiday, he's expected to make a flying trip back to Washington for the opening day baseball game.

Members of the President's staff say there is, to them, an amazing lack of understanding in some of the recent stories purporting to show that Eisenhower and Vice President Richard M. Nixon really are not so friendly because the President has virtually no social relationship with Nixon.

Eisenhower for the most part keeps his business and social activities sharply divided. Press Secretary Jim Hagerty is about the only person in government who plays golf with the President and frequently this is only to fill a foursome at the last minute. Hagerty usually is on hand when the President plays golf out of town and thus is available.

When the President and British Prime Minister Harold MacMillan met recently at Camp David, a number of reporters and photographers were allowed inside to cover the arrival of the two leaders.

Waiting for the official helicopters to come from Washington, the reporters were taken to Hickory Cottage, a large recreation hall for the sailors and marines stationed at the camp.

Two Russian correspondents were intrigued by a piece of equipment stored in one room. It was a large metal and glass machine with an array of electrical switches, a large panel of sockets, mysterious legends of letters and numbers, and a glass compartment with lights, fans and dozens of white spheroid objects.

One Russian slowly traced the metal lettering at the top of the machine, spelling it out at a letter at a time: "B-I-N-G-O."

MACMILLAN KIN DIES
