

Eagle Hope To Better 1959 Record

Eagle Point-A player turnout which includes nine lettermen, a transfer and a number of eager freshmen makes the Eagle Point high baseball club hopeful for a winning year.

The Eagles meet Glendale in their Rogue loop opener here Friday.

Coach Kenneth Vannice, in his first season at the Eagle helm, says he thinks the team should do better than Eagle Point did in 1959 when it broke even in 16 games.

Last year's big trouble was the mound. But it appears the pitching staff will be stronger this season. Jim Nease and Bill Pfeiffer may see the majority of work, but Bill Blair and Tom Perdue, both of whom have mound experience probably will see action in early games. Nease has developed some real good pitches and could mean trouble for opponents as the season progresses.

Just the opposite of last year, the catching department seems a question. Richard Herterger is expected to draw the starting assignments. Victor Halsey and Don Charley are running close behind him.

Two Infield Regulars
The Eagles shouldn't have too much trouble in the infield this year, according to Vannice. There are two regulars and two other lettermen back. Jim Nease will hold down first base when not pitching over there when Nease is on the hill. Duane Anderson is handling second base for the third year and Steve Gerren shortstop for the second season. At third base there can be Perdue to handle the chores.

A possible outfield is Madison Patrick in right, Bill Pfeiffer in center, where he is playing his third season, and Blair, one-year letterman, in left.

Nease, Wilson, Pfeiffer, Anderson and Tony Eastman have paced early hitting. Also hitting the ball well is Don Charley, a freshman. Perdue and Gerren, who rapped the ball well in 1959 are expected to catch stride soon.

The only running event in the Rogues not a relay, the high hurdle race will be scored on an individual basis. Each school will be allowed to enter three men. Three heats are planned and each individual hurdler will be timed.

Field Events Will Open Little Rogues
Phoenix - Field events, five of them, will have a 50-minute head start on the track events here Saturday in the fourth annual Little Rogue relays.

The pole vault, the shot put, discus, high jump and broad jump are to get underway at 1:30 p.m. with the javelin to be thrown when the discus event is completed. First race, the distance medley, will be at 2:40 p.m. Other contests on the oval will be the 440 yard and two-mile relays, the sprint medley and the shuttle hurdles.

Field events in the meet will be on an individual basis with each school limited to three entries. An athlete may enter four events but not more than two relays or more than three field events.

Phoenix high will be host to St. Mary's, Eagle Point, Illinois Valley and Rogue River for the relays. St. Mary's nosed out Phoenix by a half-point last year for the Lions club trophy.

Augusta, Ga. - UPB - The world's masters of the fairways started out today after the first of 1960's major golf titles - the Masters - with Arnold Palmer the betting choice and Sammy Snead and Ben Hogan the sentimental favorites.

A field of 84-17 amateurs and 67 professionals-teed off starting at 10 a.m. over the 6,980-yard Augusta National golf course.

By dusk on Sunday-barring a playoff-one of them will wear the green jacket which symbolizes one of the most coveted championships in the game.

Despite a slight attack of the flu, which he shrugged off "as nothing serious," Palmer still remained the betting favorite. But the odds on the year's leading money winner lengthened from 3-1 to 5-1, with Snead the second choice in the revised betting list at 6-1. Ken Venturi was next in line at 7-1 followed by burly Mike Souchak at 8-1.
