**Stubblefield Twin Has Pneumonia**

Portland - Jeanett Stubblefield, who was separated successfully from her Siamese twin sister, Denett, last October, was back in the University of Oregon medical school hospital today with pneumonia.

A hospital spokesman said the little girl spent a "pretty rough" night Wednesday but seemed to be a little better this morning.

The baby was brought to Portland by the parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Stubblefield, Tuesday from Parma, Idaho, after an all night drive.

Jeanette was the larger of the twins and was the one who gave doctors more concern. She was released from

the hospital Feb. 17. Her tiny sister was released two months earlier. Doctors had to perform a tracheotomy to permit Jeanette to breathe.

A similar operation was performed Tuesday when she returned.

A tracheotomy is opening secretions due to the extensive chest surgery she had undergone. The secretions settled in her lungs and the wind pipe in the neck to

permit easier breathing. Doctors said both girls had contracted upper respiratory infections but that Jeanett had difficulty coughing up the pneumonia set in.

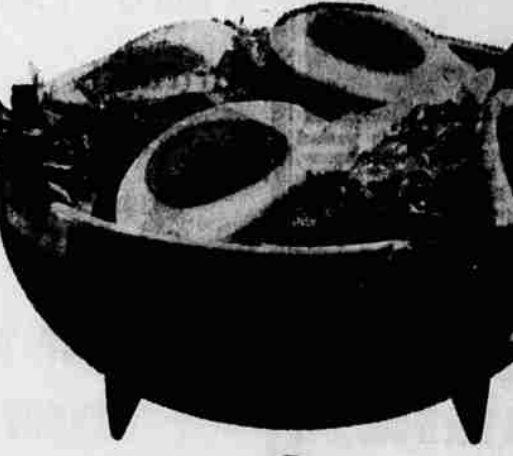
