

Prineville Judge Determined Foe For Mrs. Neuberger

Washington—Mrs. Maurine Neuberger has a determined opponent in Judge Harry C. Fowler of Prineville for the Democratic nomination for the Senate in the May primary.

Fowler was here as an Oregon delegate to the White House Conference on Children and Youth. During his stay he called on all of the Democratic members of the Oregon congressional delegations, except Sen. Hull H. Lusk, to see where they stand in the upcoming primary.

He received no commitments of support, and at the same time got the bad news that two representatives—Edith Green and Charles O. Porter—are planning to campaign in behalf of Mrs. Neuberger.

Fowler dispelled any notions that he might be "Morse's man," as some observers have suggested. He said he doesn't expect support from Sen. Wayne Morse, nor does he expect to support Morse's presidential bid in the Oregon primary.

No Comment
"I think if you would ask him, Sen. Morse would say he won't support either candidate," said Fowler. The Senator has had "no comment" on this and all political questions involving his intentions since the death of his former colleague. He has indicated, however, that he will not campaign for Mrs. Neuberger.

In his first bid for major office, the Cook county judge plans a 15 minute television program on a Portland station every Saturday night until the May 20 election in order to tell where he stands on various issues.

"I don't know where she stands on the issues," he said of Mrs. Neuberger. "She will have to tell the people that."

Probably a Liberal
Asked what sort of Democrat he regards himself, Fowler hesitated at length and then said, "I'd probably say I'm a liberal." He said he fa-

vors the changes in the labor reform bill advocated by Morse, he's against right to work laws, he favors the Ford health insurance plan for social security beneficiaries, and he favors federal power development of the Columbia and Snake rivers.

As for the idea of a national seashore park on the Oregon coast, proposed by Sen. Neuberger, Fowler said he's ready to make a definite statement for or against it.

"The issues the people are most concerned about are peace and juvenile delinquency," said Fowler.

Asked whether reports were true of Teamster backing, notably through Hugh Cole, Teamster official from Bend, Fowler said he expected to have lots of support but he hadn't talked with Cole since filing day. Concerning the funds needed to put on a regular television program, Fowler said simply: "My friends have done very well."

C. Girard Davidson, Oregon's Democratic National committee chairman, has been elevated by the party into equal advisory status with Dean Acheson, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt and other well known figures of the New and Fair Deal.

Jebby Davidson has been named chairman of a committee on natural resources of the Democratic Advisory Council. Other advisory committees are on foreign policy, economic policy, labor policy, science and technology, urban and suburban problems, farm, civil rights and social security matters.

This appointment in effect elevates Davidson, a former assistant secretary of the Interior under Oscar Chapman, to top status in the Democratic party in the natural resources field. His group is expected to develop the main theme for the party platform in this field.

U.S. Participates In Netherlands Gardening Event

New York—(Science Service)—The U. S. exhibition at the 1960 Floriade in the Netherlands represents the first participation by this country in a horticultural exposition abroad.

The Floriade, international gardening event of the year and often referred to as the Olympics of horticulture, opened March 25 in Rotterdam and will run through Sept. 25. Five million visitors are expected to attend the six-month show, in which nine nations will participate.

The history-making American exhibit is a product of joint cooperation between Government and private citizens. It is co-sponsored by the foreign agriculture service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the American Horticultural Council.

The theme of America's three-and-a-half-acre display is how Americans really live,

what kind of homes they have and what kind of gardens they have. Emphasis is on middle-income living.

One of the most unusual displays is by the Atomic

Energy Commission, demonstrating how peaceful atomic research contributes to knowledge of plant functions.

The U. S. exhibit, which features redwood throughout,

also includes a 5,000-square-foot fragrant garden of American-bred roses and a sizable display of ornamental plants by Harvard University's Arnold Arboretum.
