Five Schools Collide Here Saturday in Rogue Relays

Track and field competition at the Medford stadium for 1960 will be inaugurated Saturday.

And it will be the biggest of two home meets scheduled by the Medford High thinclads this season.

The occasion will be the 21st annual Rogue Valley relays. This traditional meet will draw athletes from five schools, all members of the Southern Oregon conference. Entrants are Crater, Klamath Falls, Ashland and Grants Pass, in addition to Medford, which is sharing the role of host with the Medford Kiwanis club.

The big first place trophy is sponsored by Kiwanis, who will assist, also, with the running of the meet.

Through the years, Grants Pass and Medford have been the main contenders for top honors. The Cavemen of Grants Pass, winners in both 1958 and 1959, look powerful again this year as a team, after topping the Roseburg invitational and winning their dual meet with Marshfield. Medford is expected to be in the thick of contention for the laurels although it has yet to display its strength as a full team.

Crater has given indication as a contender with its lopsided verdict Wednesday over Ashland in a dual fracas.

The meet will have 13 events, seven on the track and six in the field. Six running events and the high jump, broad jump and shot put will be scored as relays. The high hurdles, pole vault, discus and javelin will be individual events in each of which one school may take a maximum of two places. Schools can enter only one team each in the cinder relays. In the shot and two jumps the top efforts of three athletes of a school in each are totaled to determine a

school's placing in the particular event.

Relays will be scored 10, 8, 6, 4, 2 for first through fifth places and points in the individual contests will go on a 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 basis.

New in the meet is the high hurdles race. A special feature of the day will have Glen Wittingham in a javelin throwing exhibition. The ex-Grants Pass High athlete set a national interscholastic record while competing for the Cavemen last year.

Individual Performance
 While team effort will count most in the engagement, there will be interest in the performances of some of the standout athletes of each school. Medford has an all-around man in Mike Hood, who starred in all-corners meets last summer. It has such thinclads as Len Griggs and Phil Humphreys in the dash and broad jump. Walt Ayres in the hurdles, Ray Smith in the distances and middle distances, Terry Ryan in quarter, Jerry Shulis and Bob McIntyre in the high jump and Skip Bennett in the pole vault.

Among the GP Cavemen are Larry Holmes and Dan McIntire in the vault, Ray Meek in the dashes, Steve Bennett and Ron Hoatson in the weights, Dave Staley in the quarter, Marshall in the half and Steve Ausland in the javelin.

Crater has Don Ryan and Bob Morris in the distance and middle distance, Gary Wald and Dick Woods in the sprints, Chuck Turner, Woods and Dennis Edwards in the broad jump, Derrill Williamson in the weights, John Champ in the hurdles, and

Burton in the hurdles and javelin.

Allan Phillips, broad jumper and javelin man, is the Klamath Falls standout and Bob Voris, quarter-miler and hurdler, and Steve Gray, sprinter and broad jumper, head the Ashland squad.

St. Louis Evens Pro Hoop Series

St. Louis, Mo. —(UPI)—There was more concern over the referees than the teams today as the St. Louis Hawks and Boston Celtics headed back to Boston for the game Saturday which will decide the championship of the National Basketball association.

Easy Ed MacAuley, St. Louis coach, wants anybody but Jim Duffy as one of the officials for the deciding game in the best of seven series. Red Auerbach, Boston's coach, prefers Duffy ahead of all of the other NBA officials.

Ben Kerner, the Hawk owner, and MacAuley huddled with NBC President Maurice Podoloff and supervisor of referees Jocko Collins for almost two hours here Thursday night after St. Louis had evened the series at three games apiece with a 105-102 victory over the Celtics.

Hang On At Finish
 One thing is certain. Mendy Rudolph, who worked Thursday's game with Duffy, will be one of the officials in Boston.

Buried in the post-game turmoil was the actual contest itself. The Hawks blew a 27-point lead, but hung on at the finish to maintain the series pattern, which has been Boston winning one and then St. Louis evening the count.

Cliff Hagan pumped in 36 points for the Hawks, before being injured in a collision during the last minute of play and being forced from the game.

The Celtics, gunning for their third NBA title in four seasons, scored only 16 points in the first quarter and 12 in the third period. A 38-point Boston spree in the final session fell short.

Phoenix—Five of the smaller schools of the Rogue river valley primed today for their own relay track meet.

The contenders are Rogue River, Illinois Valley, Eagle Point, St. Mary's and Phoenix High schools. They will clash Saturday in the Little Rogue meet at Phoenix.

St. Mary's of Medford, only Class B school in the meet but a big school in its class, is the defending champion and will seek its second leg on the Lions' track trophy. Eagle Point is twice winner of the hardware and Phoenix has taken it once. Three wins are needed to retire the trophy.

The Crusaders of Medford took the toga last year by a slim half-point over Phoenix and the two schools went on to finish one-two in the Class C Hayward relays at Eugene, Illinois Valley, Eagle Point and St. Mary's enter the fifth annual meet as unknown quantities although SM is expected to be strong. Phoenix showed its strength by beating Rogue River in a dual meet on Wednesday.

The Little Rogue tussle has 11 events and is patterned after the Class B and C divisions of the Haywards.

Right Foot For Olson

Portland, Ore. —(UPI)—Carl (Bobo) Olson has started another comeback in Portland. This time the comeback of Olson's got off on the right foot.

Olson scored a 7th round technical knockout over Roque Maravilla in their scheduled 10-round fight here Thursday night. Olson weighed 175 and Maravilla 176.

The last time the former middleweight champion started a comeback in this town it ended in disaster. He was kayoed in the first round by Pat McMurdy in 1958. That was right after Olson had his ill-fated fight with Archie Moore which also ended in Olson's being knocked out.

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
