A. J. Johannson, Medford, who is Oregon AAUW fellow-ship chairman. The grants are for varying amounts from \$2,000 to \$4,000 each. The name was chosen to honor Mrs. Paul R. Smith, Medford AAUW member who is the retiring president of Oregon Education association. The grant was named at a
