District Attorney Reaffirms Statement To Interim Group

District Attorney Thomas J. Reeder reaffirmed today Saturday's testimony before the legislative interim committee on criminal law here.

He had testified that defense counsel appointed by the court should receive more money for such cases than allowed by the law. Considerable pre-trial work is done by the "very conscientious" Jackson county attorneys yet they are paid only \$15 a day while in court for a total maximum fee of \$45 for non-murder cases. Murder cases bring a maximum fee of \$150 when a defense counsel is court-appointed, Reeder explained. The law should be changed in this respect, he said.

Habitual Criminal
Reeder had also urged that the habitual criminal law be modified or repealed since the present statute is now "unworkable and can have most unfair results if literally applied."

The law pertaining to psychiatric testimony, where insanity is the defense, should be changed so both prosecution and defense have access to complete examination of the defendant, Reeder suggested.

The defense counsel should be allowed also to obtain from the state prior statements pertaining to the crime. The laws prohibiting commercial gambling should be revised, also.

Rancher Shaping Fight To Regain Tax-Seized Land

Eldridge, N.D.—UPI—Farmer Fay Heasley made plans today for a legal fight to regain his 4,500 acre wheat ranch sold by the federal government for back income taxes.

Heasley bowed to a federal court order and moved his family off the \$350,000 ranch. "But I'm not done," Heasley said. "We've got to fight for our rights," said Paul Heasley, Fay's son.

But while the Heasley family studied legal avenues, the new owners, Mr. and Mrs. Arvil Glinz of Newburg, N.D., took over the prime wheat land. They bought it from the federal government for \$225,300.

Heasley, now in his 60s, started the farm "with an applebox" 41 years ago. He survived the depression and drought of the '30s only to lose a tax battle with the government.

Tax Bill Grips
Six years ago, the government presented him with a tax bill for \$40,000. Heasley refused to pay it, and the bill got bigger every day. When the government finally stepped in and sold the farm Heasley's bill was more than \$200,000. And another \$25 is added to that figure every day. It was during the "golden" '40s that the rich land poured money into Heasley's pockets. And it was during those same years the trouble with the government began.

Heasley was charged with "grossly" understating his income for the years 1944-49. It was contended that he claimed excessive deductions with "intent to evade taxes."
