Counting contests matching Southern Oregon conference baseball teams are scheduled on Friday at Ashland and at Klamath Falls. Ashland will be host to Grants Pass and Klamath Union High school to Crater. Doubleheaders are planned with the first tussle in each case to be the league game and the other to be a kings-x till.

Dick Ragsdale may move in to fill the third base vacancy created when Ken Durkee was critically injured Sunday in an auto accident. That was the indication of Coach John Kovenz as the Medford high baseball team prepared for two non-league tangles this week.

Medford is scheduled to vie at Ashland on Wednesday and to oppose Crater here on Saturday. While all three schools are members of the Southern Oregon conference, neither of the tussles will count in league standings.

Kovenz said that Ray Stewart also is a possibility at third base. He said that Bob Quinney is another who has played the position. Ragsdale, who is capable of playing several infield positions, has been seeing regular duty in the outfield. Quinney has been an outfielder and pitcher this year and is an all-around player.

Boxer Given Little Hope

Madison, Wis.—Charlie Mohr, University of Wisconsin All-American boxer, continued his fight for life early today, but his doctor gave him only a slim chance of surviving.

The 22-year-old middleweight was knocked out in the finals of the NCAA tournament Saturday. He collapsed in the dressing room after walking out of the ring under his own power, and was rushed to the university hospital for surgery.

Dr. M. Javid, associate professor of neuro-surgery at Wisconsin, performed the operation, aided by three other doctors.

Dr. Javid said Mohr suffered "acute sub-dural hematoma with marked brain damage and with irreversible damage to the mid brain." The doctor said the bleeding was beneath the cover of the brain and "in cases such as this the chances of surviving are very minimal."

Palmer, Ike Play Golf

Augusta, Ga.—Arnold Palmer, the 1960 Masters champion, is an almost nervous golfer.

However, the nation's top professional was a little tense Monday when he accepted an invitation to play a round with one of the world's best-known amateur golfers, Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The scene of the match was Augusta's National golf course, where Palmer won the Masters Sunday for the second time in three years.

The President hit a creditable drive and did not require a "mulligan"—practice shot—as he frequently does.

When Palmer addressed his ball, he seemed more awed by the presence of the Chief Executive than the thousands of spectators who followed him during last week's tournament.

"I don't know whether the pressure was greater yesterday or today," said Palmer, who then hit one of his patented booming drives.

Major Gen. Leonard D. Heaton, the Army's surgeon general who accompanied Eisenhower from Washington, and Clifford Roberts, chairman of the Augusta National, completed the presidential foursome.

Tausig, who probably will play center field, hit .245 for Charleston of the American Association last season, including 12 home runs. Brideweiser is expected to play second base.

The two newcomers were purchased from Tacoma through the San Francisco Giant organization.

Royals, N.Y., Pick Most On NBA Basketball Draft

New York—The Cincinnati Royals and the New York Knickerbockers wound up with more than one-third of the 100 college players selected in the National Basketball Association draft.

The Royals claimed 20 players, including three-time All-American Oscar Robertson of the University of Cincinnati, while the Knickerbockers drafted 18.

The world champion Boston Celtics, on the other hand, picked only six collegians in the annual draft conducted Monday at a midtown New York hotel.

The Royals and the Knicks wound up in the basement of their respective divisions during the past season, so they can use some help.

Royals Claim "Big O"

The Royals claimed Robertson, the greatest major league scorer in history, as a territorial choice although they had first crack at the "Big O" anyway by virtue of their poor 19-56 record.

The Minneapolis Lakers were next and they picked Jerry West of West Virginia, an All-American for the past two seasons. Then the Knicks drafted Darrall Imhoff, 6-foot 10-inch All-America from California.

There were no surprise selections among the remaining first-round picks. Robertson, West and Imhoff will not be permitted to sign pro contracts until after they play for the U.S. Olympic team in Rome this summer.

The same applies to Jay Arnette of Texas, who was the Royals' second round choice.

Oregon Coach Starts 10th Football Year

Eugene—Coach Len Casanova opened his 10th season as football mentor at Oregon Monday as 68 candidates turned out for the 1960 team in the first day of spring practice.

Only three of last fall's 11 starters are returning, backs Dave Grosz and Dave Grayson and guard Dave Urell.

But there are 14 lettermen in all plus a good crop of freshmen and transfers.

Among those missing from the 1960 team will be all coast back Willie West and all coast center Bob Peterson.

British Want Golf Changes

London—The British Professional Golfers' Assn. came up with some radical proposals today for the 1961 Ryder Cup competition with the United States.

The British PGA is recommending that the competition consist of eight foursome matches of 18 holes each instead of four matches of 18 holes each instead of the current eight at 36 holes.

The group said it is recommending the changes "to create more interest and bring the match more in line with the normal game of golf."
