## 'Stop Kennedy' Move Seen in West Virginia

Washington - (UPI) - There signs today that the Kennedy camp would like to down-grade the West Virginia primary lest it be overrated as a factor in settling the Democratic presidential nomination.

Forecasts have come since the Wisconsin primary that Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) could just about clinch the nomination by winning the May 10 West Virginia primary from Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.), the loser in Wisconsin.

A defeat for Kennedy in West Virginia would forestall any bandwagon scramble by uncommitted national convention delegates to throw their support to him two months ahead of the convention.

While Kennedy is outwardly confident about West Virginia, his supporters are citing reasons for worry about the outcome.

They are voicing fear that backers of all other Democratic candidates will rally behind Humphrey in a "stop Kennedy" movement. They also see Humphrey as the chief beneficiary of support from the United Mine Workers Union, a potent force in West Virginia.

Still another unknown factor is the impact of the religious issue. Kennedy, a Catholic, appeared to have benefited more in Wisconsin from the votes of Catholics than he was hurt by anti-Catholic votes.

Unlike Wisconsin, where 30 per cent of the people are Catholics, West Virginia's population is less than 5 per cent Catholic. West Virginia could provide a better clue as to whether there still is an anti-Catholic vote like that which contributed to the 1928 defeat of Democratic candidate Alfred E. Smith.

Well Deserved Rest  
Meanwhile, the sergeants rested here last night after walking 99 miles in two days. Observers pointed out that they had reached Cordelia, some 10 miles east of Sonoma, after their first day's hike.

Unander Cleared For Maritime Post  
Washington - (UPI) - The Senate Commerce Committee Wednesday cleared the nomination of Sig Unander for a post on the federal maritime board.

Unander, former Oregon state treasurer, has been serving on the board since he was appointed last winter. Congress was not in session to confirm the appointment then.

Alaska senators had delayed committee approval by criticizing Unander's stand advocating increased shipping rates between Puget Sound and Alaska.

The Alaskans dropped their opposition a week ago, but the civil rights bill delayed Unander's confirmation until Wednesday.

## Differences of Opinion Are Noted in Great Decisions Vote

Differences of opinion among Oregon residences concerning Red China showed up recently when the state's Great Decisions participants balloted on the foreign policy issue "Red China on the March... What U.S. Action?"

On the national scene, 81 per cent of the voters felt the same way. Fifty-two per cent of the Jackson county participants agreed.

Opinion ballots from Oregon counties were tabulated this week by Oregon State College extension service.

Regarding recognition of Communist China, state-wide opinion was divided over three propositions. Thirty-six per cent said to continue present nonrecognition policy. Twenty per cent said to offer recognition if Peiping will make important concessions, such as renunciation of the use of force.

The vote on China's seat in the United Nations was split about the same way.

Only 4 per cent of the state's voters, and 1.3 per cent of the Jackson county voters favored accepting Red China's right to control all territories now controlled by Nationalist China.

Embargo Policy  
Voters disagreed on trade embargo policy. Twenty-eight per cent said to continue embargo on all U. S. trade with Red China; 20 per cent voted to relax embargo on trade; and 36 per cent suggested relaxing trade embargo on Red China to match U.S. restrictions on trade with the U.S.S.R.

Nearly all of the Great Decisions participants who offered opinions on the topic "What Chances for India's Middle Way?" favored some change in present U.S. policies toward India.

Prior to voting, Great Decisions group members had spent a week of study and discussion on the problems of India, the world's largest democracy (population 400 million).

Greatest agreement came on economic matters. Seventy-eight per cent of the state voters, 80 per cent of the U.S. voters, and 90 per cent of the Jackson county voters supported "joint consultation by the U.S. and other industrialized democracies with India, in preparation for a coordinated and expanded international aid program in support of India's development plans."

On the political front, 59 per cent of the state's voters favored U. S. support for greater Indian participation in international conferences such as summit meetings. Fifty-seven per cent for U.S. diplomatic support to India in its border dispute with Red China.

Nearly half of the state's voters favored U.S. support for a permanent UN Security Council seat for India.

Fifty-six per cent favored sending U. S. military aid to India, if requested; but only 29 per cent wanted the U.S. to give armed support to India in case of war with Red China.

The vote was divided on military aid to Pakistan. Thirty-two per cent said to continue it, 29 per cent said to discontinue it, and 6 per cent to discontinue it.

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## California Eases Scabies Regulation

Salem - (UPI) - The Oregon Agriculture Department said today California has modified its scabies regulation on cattle from this state and as a result movement of cattle into California will be easier for most areas of Oregon.

California Agriculture Chief J. E. Stuart said the new requirements include removal of the treatment edict on dairy cattle and lifting of the permit and treatment stipulation on beef cattle in all sections of Oregon except Baker, Wallowa, Malheur, Grant and Union counties.

Beef animals in those five counties still have to have a prior permit from California and require scabies treatment.

The California quarantine was announced earlier this year when a case of the disease was found in a Baker county herd.

Bedford, Pa. - (UPI) - An automobile driven by a New Jersey woman spun out of control on the Pennsylvania Turnpike Wednesday and soared a measured 175 feet into the tops of two trees.

Mrs. Francis Caniff, Millburn, N. J., was thrown from the car as it left an embankment along the turnpike four miles west of the Bedford interchange.

The 66-year-old woman suffered a badly bruised eye and lacerated eyelid. Memorial hospital said it would be several days before the full extent of the eye injury could be learned.

## Canadian Navy Plane Down at Sea

Hamilton, Bermuda - (UPI) - A twin-engine patrol plane of the Canadian navy ditched in the Atlantic off Bermuda early today after losing its position and running low on fuel. All aboard were rescued at mid-morning by a German freighter, the U. S. Coast Guard reported.

Air Force and Coast Guard search planes sighted the survivors on a rubber raft and summoned aid from surface ships. First to the scene was the West German vessel Sternefels.
