Capitol Memo UO Research Bureau Discovers Reasons For Teachers Moving

By DOUGLAS GRIPP Salem—(UPI)—Another flock of Oregon teachers gave their schools and students the heave in 1959 and moved to what they considered greener pastures in California and Washington. Most of them are happy, too.

Alarmed by this trend, the Legislative Interim Committee on Education asked the University of Oregon's Bureau of Educational Research to find out why.

Dr. Keith Goldhammer, bureau director, has turned over the results of the study to the committee. The researchers found that at least 359 Oregon teachers relocated last year. All were queried, 49 per cent replied and most said it was better that they made them move.

Reasons Broken Down The Goldhammer group broke down the reasons into three sections: Economic, personal and professional. Of the 359, 190 moved to California and 169 to Washington. Higher pay was California's biggest lure while the chief reason for moving to Washington was because their spouses were transferred or got work there. More money also was a factor in the Evergreen state.

The average salary increase of those moving to California was \$977 a year and in Washington \$617. Some Samples The unsatisfied teachers were asked why they moved. Some samples: "There is a closer relationship between administrators and teaching staff."

Teachers have standing in the community (in the new locale) ... "Less interferences with teachers by school boards, principals, and parents, more attention to discipline ... few useless meetings, no lesson plans required."

One irate teacher wrote: "Some young veterans from World War II holding public relations jobs in the name of principals are a menace to Oregon."

Recurring Theme The recurring theme in moving for professional reasons was better opportunity for advancement in larger school systems in more populous areas, and a lighter load. Along with higher salaries, other economic drawing cards for California and Washington included better state support of schools, a better state retirement system and a more liberal system of fringe benefits.

New Herbicide Kills Young Plants

London, (Science Service)—A new herbicide has been reported that is especially effective in killing young plants yet has a low acute toxicity for warm-blooded animals. It is active against many weeds, such as wild oat, bracken, chickweed and cleavers. Seeds of some plants, however, such as rice, groundnuts, corn and sunflower, show a distinct resistance to it.

The substance is 2,6-dichlorobenzonitrile and is known by the code name H 133. Experiments involving its use were described in the British scientific journal Nature here by H. Koopman and J. Daams of N.V. Philips-Duphar, Holland.

H 133 was found to be especially effective in inhibiting germination of seeds. It is easily absorbed by seeds either from a solution or from the vapor. Young growing tips were found to be very sensitive to the compound, which acts via the roots as well as by way of the green parts of the plants.

Experiments in which respiration or photosynthesis was measured showed that neither of these processes in tobacco leaves was inhibited if the leaves were placed in a saturated solution of H 133.
