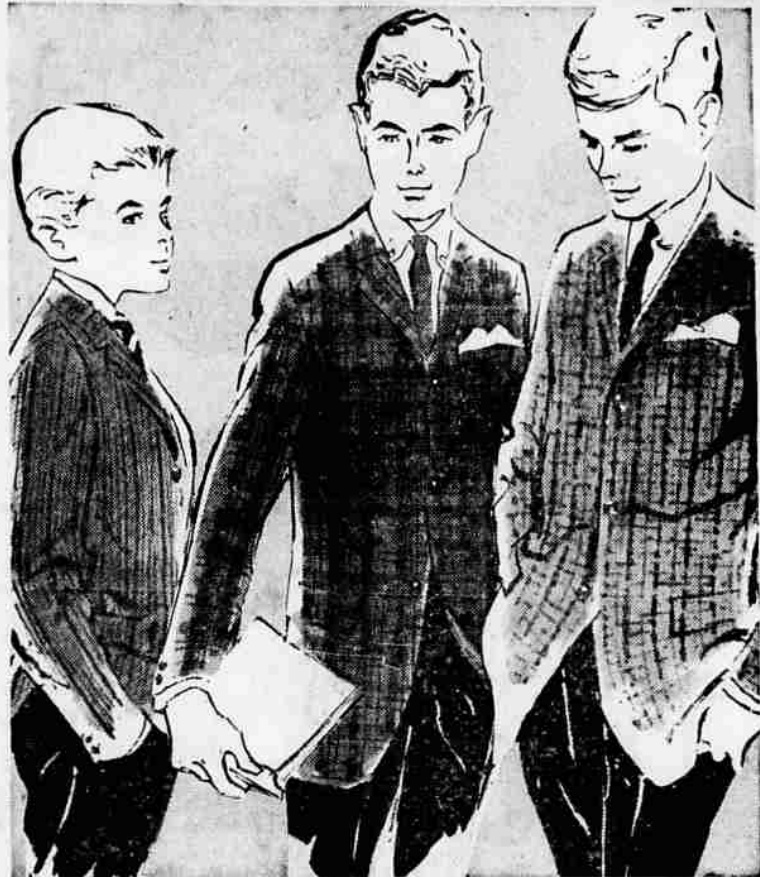

Anthony Steel  
Reported Missing

Garmisch - Partenkirchen, Germany—(UP)—British actor Anthony Steel was reported today to have been missing from a Bavarian hotel for a week.

Mrs. George Bader, wife of the owner of the Sonnenbichl Hotel in this Alpine resort, said she has filed a missing person report with local police because Steel has been missing from his room since April 7.

The Garmisch chief of police said he had no information that Steel, former husband of actress Anita Ekberg, might have disappeared while mountain climbing. No Alpine patrols have been alerted to look for the actor, he said.

Mrs. Bader said Steel's absence was not at first thought surprising because he earlier had left the hotel for two days. When he returned, she said, he said he had made a trip to Innsbruck, Austria.

In Rome, Miss Ekberg's press agent said he doubted the report.

"We would know if something terrible happened to him," he said.

1st National To  
Use New System

Portland—(UP)—The First National Bank of Oregon today announced plans to spend \$1,700,000 for what it called one of the most advanced electronic bank data processing systems in the country.

C. B. Stephensen, president of the 82-office statewide banking system, said the order was placed with International Business Machines Corporation. He said it would be the first large scale magnetic tape computer installation in a Pacific Northwest bank.

The system will be installed by the end of 1961.

Stephensen said the bank was turning to the electronic equipment to keep pace with an increasing volume of checks and to cope with the time-consuming task of book-keeping.

Although numbered commercial accounts will be used throughout the statewide system, complete conversion to electronic data processing, which performs many book-keeping functions now done manually, will be confined to the bank's offices in the Portland Metropolitan area, Stephensen said.

Baldock-Sunset  
Connector Planned

Portland—(UP)—A \$6 million freeway more than 2 1/2 miles long connecting the Baldock freeway and the Sunset highway through the Beaverton and Tigard areas may be approved by the State Highway Commission.

More than 200 residents of the Beaverton area met to discuss the proposal Tuesday. The expressway would connect with the Sunset highway at the Cedar Hills interchange and pass just to the east of Beaverton along Southern Pacific tracks. It will then go east of Tigard and south to connect with the Baldock freeway at Bonita road.

At first, the highway would cross U.S. 99 at grade level, but later an overpass was planned. The Highway Commission has programmed \$1,200,000 to get the project underway.

FORMER JUDGE DIES

Cambridge, Mass.—(UP)—Manley O. Hudson, 73, a former judge on the Permanent Court of International Justice (The World Court) at The Hague, The Netherlands, and professor emeritus of international law at Harvard University, died Wednesday.

Maurine Neubeger  
Expects Votes on  
Her Own Merits

Washington—(UP)—Maurine Neubeger, Democratic candidate for the Oregon Senate seat held by her late husband, told a crowded news conference Wednesday she expected people to vote for her on her own merits.

The widow of Sen. Richard L. Neubeger (D-Ore.) said she did not expect to be a "replacement for Dick." She said she would be "inadequate" in that job.

"I expect the people of Oregon to vote for me for myself," she said.

In response to a question she said she did not think that Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) would oppose her. But she added that Morse has not expressed himself one way or another.

"He's busy running for President," she said. "I can't figure out why he'd oppose me."

Went Seek His Support  
Mrs. Neubeger made it clear that she has no intention of seeking Morse's public support. She said she "resumed" she would have the backing of other members of the Oregon congressional delegation.

She said she expects Morse to win the Oregon presidential primary. She said Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) and Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) probably would run ahead of Sens. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) and Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) because they are better known.

Her own personal candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination is Adlai Stevenson. She refrained from selecting another possibility because Stevenson is not running in the primary.

Mrs. Neubeger appeared pale and thin, but in discussing her political future she spoke with animation.

Going Home in May  
She told reporters she was sure her husband would be "glad" she was running. "That's the only reason I'm doing it," she added.

She said she expects to leave for Oregon between May 7 and 9.

Mrs. Neubeger also said Gov. Mark Hatfield might be a late entry in the Senate race against her.

She said Hatfield was "scheduled" to run for the Senate in 1962, when Morse is up for reelection. "But if he felt I was easier pickings, he'd be in there."

Mrs. Neubeger said Hatfield could be entered in the race after the primary by the state GOP Central Committee if the candidate nominated May 20 withdrew due to illness or other reasons.

She noted that Hatfield had recently denied any such intention.
