Famous European Spa Place To Lose Clothes, Weight

Baden-Baden, Germany - (UPI) - It takes spunk to take a bath in Baden-Baden and if you'll hold with me for a minute I'll tell you why.

This superbly handsome city in the Black Forest is one of Europe's most renowned spas. Its hot mineral springs first were discovered by the Romans 2,000 years ago. And today, the resort caters to those who want to regain the shape they once had, to polio victims or others who need therapeutic treatment, and to those for whom physicians have prescribed baths for what one Baden-Badenite called manager's disease-overwork and over-worry.

Fortunately, my interest was in the first. After a few days of eating my way through Germany via Frankfurt and Heidelberg to Baden-Baden, it was increasingly difficult to zipper my dresses closed.

One of the city's thermal baths won't take off all the excess, but the management of the Grosse Gesellschaftsbad asks all patrons to weigh in and weigh out at the end of the two-hour siege. It said some customers lose as much as four pounds.

I found that you also lose, for the time being, all your clothes. Fortunately for this inhibited American, the ladies baths were separate.

They guided me to the steam room, where the temperature was only 120 degrees F. and where hearty souls climb to the highest marble slab in the room for maximum cooking. Nothing would do more for the girdle business than a photo of a batch of women in a steam-room.

Anyway, I climbed to the top, and right back down to the lowest level, and 10 minutes later a kindly hand helped me to the swimming pool-warm. As I settled back for 30 minutes of lolling, I thought, this isn't so bad, you know... I do feel better.

But there were other rooms, other pools and the last one I plunged into without pre-testing. I promptly froze. I later checked and found the water was just above freezing. Wasting no time, I hopped out.

As the attendant laughed and I shook, she said, now you must rest.

The ley dip had awakened me for a week, but she insisted, as she wrapped me in a heavy blanket and parked me on a cot. A few minutes later, I was led to a scale, where I weighed - well never mind. Anyway, I got my clothes back, and figured that given a year at Baden-Baden, I might not only feel but LOOK like BB.
