

# Morse Chides Administration on Resources Development

## Lockheed Aircraft Seeks Cause Of Crashes Involving Electras

Washington—(UPI)—Lockheed Aircraft Corp. is deliberately baring its jet-prop Electra airliners with violent forces in the air and on the ground to find out why two of the planes crashed.

The mysterious accidents killed all 83 persons aboard a Northwest Airlines Electra near Tell City, Ind., March 17, and all 34 passengers on a Braniff Airways Electra at Buffalo, Tex., last September.

In an effort to find the cause of the crashes, Lockheed is flying an Electra into areas of extreme turbulence over a California mountain range. The heavily instrumented plane is being put through violent maneuvers at varying combinations of weight and speed.

The company disclosed the unprecedented steps to solve the mystery of the accidents in an unusual "memo to editors" Thursday.

In addition to dangerous airborne tests, another Electra with approximately the same accumulated flight time as the ill-fated Tell City plane is being subjected to "static testing"—shaking the plane mechanically to determine the effects of stress and vibration on key structural parts.

## Pope Expresses Hopes for Peace For United States

Rome—(UPI)—Pope John XXIII expressed his hopes for "a just and lasting concord between all people" and peace and prosperity for the United States in a Good Friday message to the American people today.

His recorded message was released to American broadcasting stations on the most solemn day of the year for the Christian world, commemoration of the death of Christ on the cross.

The Pope kneels barefooted before a crucifix in the Rome basilica of St. Mary Major today to lead the world's half-billion Roman Catholics in the observance. Bells were silent and altars stripped bare in token of mourning.

**Adoration of Cross**  
The central part of the ceremony is the adoration of the cross. The Pope walks barefooted to the cross, kneels three times, and kisses the feet of the crucifix. Cardinals dressed in purple mourning follow him in the adoration. They then take communion.

Not until midnight Saturday will the altars be decorated again and the bells be set to ringing out the Easter news that Christ has risen from the dead.

The Pope's message was addressed specifically to American Catholics, but he sent his greetings to the entire population.

"We greet, with the affection of our paternal heart, the entire American people, towards whom we cherish sentiments of warm benevolence and admiration," the message said.

**Asks God's Blessing**  
"This message reaches you in America on the day when Christian peoples are commemorating the passion and death of the Savior of mankind. We wish to assure you that in our daily prayers we beg our Lord to pour forth His blessings and the abundance of His redeeming grace upon each one of you and upon your families and dear ones."

In Jerusalem, 35,000 pilgrims crowded into churches and shrines for Easter celebrations, the greatest number in memory. They included Christians of all faiths.

## Stocks Rally on Rush of Late Buying

New York—(UPI)—Stocks rallied on a flurry of late buying Thursday with electronics leading motors and steels and scattered blue chips pacing the upsurge.

Universal Match spurred nearly 8 on sharply higher first quarter sales and earnings. Western Union continued to retreat on its recently disappointing earnings.

American Motors was active, gaining a point on the report of record Rumber sales during the first 10 days of April. Chrysler and General Motors rose solid fractions. Ford steadied.

## Hearing Set on District Budget

Central Point—Public hearing on a proposed \$31,458 budget for 1960-1961 for the Central Point Rural Fire Protection district is scheduled May 3, Chairman C. C. Thompson of the district board has announced.

Final approval of the board and budget committee on the projected outlay was given April 12.

Thompson said the principal increase was for setting up a fund of \$1,500 for emergency repair and replacement of equipment. He reported that the board felt this was better than increasing the amount budgeted for repair and replacement. If no such emergency arises, he pointed out, the money from the emergency fund would be credited to the 1961-1962 levy.

Millage rate will likely be increased 2 of a mill which would be approximately a total of 3.6 mills. The budget is still substantially below the 6 per cent statutory limitation allowed for increase.

John Layden is chairman of the budget committee and other citizen members of the committee are Franklin Gebhard, Philip Hoffman, Homer Conger and Ed Taylor. District board members on the committee are Thompson, Claud Hoover, B. Sam Taylor, Charles Bateman and Ray Vogel.

## Senator Raps Waiting Until Election Year

Hood River—(UPI)—Senator Wayne Morse, winding up a six-day tour of Oregon, Thursday night chided the Eisenhower administration for waiting until a presidential election year "to toss a few carefully budgeted crumbs to resource development."

Morse told local Democrats that the Republican administration's "no new starts" policy on dams went by the boards this year.

He said this "about face" was heartening "but on closer examination the change in policy turned out to be a little like the case of a drowning man, who expecting to have a life preserver tossed to him, found there was nothing on the end of the line."

The Democratic party, he said, must restore this country to a "sound, sensible policy of resource development."

**Blasts GOP Policies**  
Morse said he had been working to see that adequate appropriations were made by Congress this year to continue construction on multi-purpose dams in the Pacific Northwest. "This year—a presidential election year, mind you—the Democrats have by strange coincidence, begun to get just a trace of help from the administration."

Morse, a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, said it was the Democratic party which historically had advocated maximum development of the people's resources for the people's benefit.

"And it was the Republican party," he said, "... which conceived the onerous Dixon-Yates deal; which has slowed down federal power projects and opposed new starts; which stalled atomic energy development; which has repeatedly attempted to cripple rural electrification; which worked with all its might to give away the magnificent Hells Canyon site."

Morse said the administration record on resource development was built on two basic assumptions—"One, that the nation's resources should be given away to private interests, or that, where possible, 'partnership' deals be arranged to permit the federal government to subsidize the private interests; and two, that a dollar spent on resources developed is a dollar wasted, and therefore, as few dollars as possible should be spent."

**Bill Criticized**  
"But suddenly," he said, "in the year 1960 this is changed. The President himself, in his budget message in January, said his budget recommendations for resource development 'take into account their great importance to the nation's economic growth and security.'"

He said "we cannot have new starts limited to presidential years alone."

Morse also criticized a bill before Congress which he said would grant perpetual federal subsidies to private companies which build dams upstream from federal dams.

He said he would continue his fight for needed new starts and full development of water resources. "But the fight will be uphill and disheartening until we get a Democratic president in the White House," he added.

Morse left after the speech for Washington, D.C.

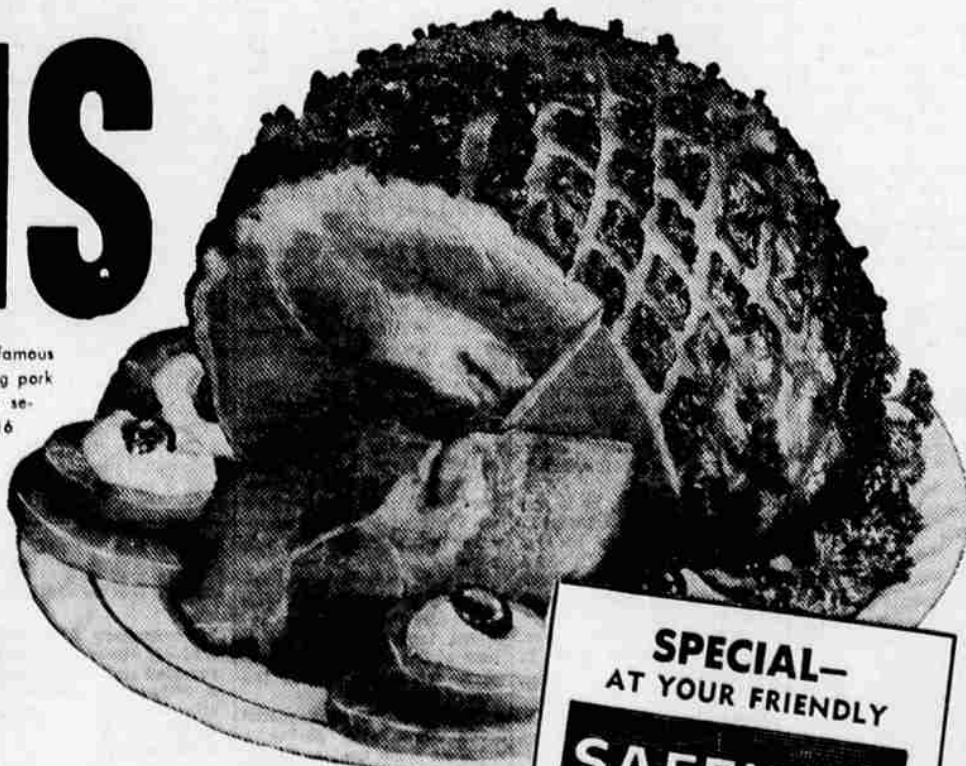
