Eugene - Southern Oregon flashed its strength Friday for the second consecutive year in the Class C division of the Hayward Relays - this year more emphatically than last.

Jackson county entries, St. Mary's of Medford, Phoenix and Rogue River wound up one-two-three.

The St. Mary's Crusaders with victories in four events and records in two claimed their second straight Hayward mantle with 42 points.

By United Press International - San Jose yielded only an eighth-inning home run to Walt Moryn Saturday when he pitched a one-hitter that carried the San Francisco Giants to a 6-1 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

A crowd of 29,771 at the \$15-million Candlestick Park in San Francisco roundly booed Moryn's blast off Jones, who had pitched a three-hitter against the St. Louis Cardinals in his opening day assignment. Jones pitched a no-hit-

ter against the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1955 and also pitched a seven-inning "no-hitter" last September.

Moryn said afterwards he may have saved the San Francisco Giant right hander from a bad season.

"You know how it is with some pitchers who get those no-hitters," Moryn said. "They often have a bad year after that. Not that I did Sam any favor today."

A 21-game winner in 1959, Jones walked three batters Saturday and struck out the same number.

The Giants scored one run off Dick Drott in the first inning but did most of their damage against Glen Hobbie, who took over when the starter developed a sore arm.

Willie Mays and Orlando Cepeda had two hits each for San Francisco.
