Today's artistic Easter Sunday page is the work of The Mail Tribune's staff photographer, Robert Vroman. He borrowed the potted lily from Ginn's flower shop and took it out to his home with the idea of taking a picture with scattered fleecy clouds as a backdrop. But the wind was blowing that day, and the lily blossoms moved so rapidly that he gave up that idea.

So Photographer Bob put the lily in his car again and drove out into the country looking for a spot which provided what he considered a suitable artistic setting, and protection from the wind. He at length was rewarded by finding a roadside pile of rocks and gathering up some grass and weed stalks, he covered the pot with these and proceeded with his picture taking.

The country road was deserted during the entire operation, which pleased the cameraman. "I didn't want anyone to think that Easter lilies were starting to grow along the roadside in the Roxy Ann area," said Mr. V.

Guests who received invitations to Princess Margaret's coming wedding to Antony Armstrong-Jones probably found nothing unusual in the wording. But the news item in The Mail Tribune found it highly intriguing.

Of course, we didn't see one of the invitations—which it is said some members of European royalty are "spurning", but a copy of one came in on the UPI telephoto service. The name of the person to whom it was sent is carefully covered over.

The royal coat of arms is at the top of the page, and the invitation then begins "The Lord Chamberlain to Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother is commanded by Her Majesty (all this on three lines but with no punctuation) to invite (blank) to the Ceremony of the Marriage of Her Royal Highness The Princess Margaret with Mr. Antony Armstrong-Jones in Westminster Abbey on Friday 6th May, 1960 at 11:30 o'clock a.m."

The "a.m." surprised us, since such invitations in this country usually read "in the morning" or "in the afternoon." In the lower left hand corner three lines of small type read "Dress: Morning Dress (or Lounge Suit) Serving Officers—Ceremonial Day Dress, and Ladies: Morning Dress with Hat." The Tribune femmes were also surprised at the fact that it should be found necessary to instruct the women to wear hats to a formal morning wedding ceremony.

In the lower right hand corner another three lines give instructions about answering. It reads "An answer is requested addressed to the Lord Chamberlain to Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, Clarence House, St. James's, S.W.1." The caption with the photo also said that a separate request for an immediate reply accompanied the invitation.

The UPI wirephoto service also brought a copy of the cover of the "Approved Souvenir Programme." It also has the coat of arms and above it the inscription "Published by Gracious Permission of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother". The cover lists the names of the bride and bridegroom, the date and place of the coming nuptials and at the bottom of the cover is lettered "King George's Jubilee Trust" and the price, three shillings and sixpence. We found ourselves viewing the idea of the souvenir program with a faint distaste, but perhaps the funds will be used for charity.

The cover was designed by Ernest Wallcoustons, who also designed covers for the coronation of the late King George VI, the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II and the queen's wedding.

According to the New York Times, this happened at Bergdorf Goodman: A pretty young woman was waiting for a fitting room to be made available. Next to her stood a tall, handsome young man. When the customer's turn came, the saleslady politely asked the young man if he would care to accompany the young woman into the fitting room.
