## Two Car Accidents Reported to Police

Heavy property damage was reported by state police in two separate automobile accidents, one Thursday morning on Highway 238 at Griffin Creek bridge, and a two vehicle crash Wednesday at 5:45 p.m. at the intersection of Ross lane and Hanley rd.

John Henry Stallworth, 24, of 296 Edwards st., was lodged in the county jail on a charge of being drunk on a public highway Thursday after his eastbound vehicle on Highway 238 hit a ditch, skidded and bounced 140 feet, crossed the highway and hit the northeast corner of the bridge. The car was reported demolished.

The Wednesday afternoon incident occurred, according to police, when a vehicle operated by Rosie Darlene Brood, 25, of 415 Edwards st., turned left onto Ross lane from Hanley rd. Her vehicle hit a car operated by John Russel Acheson, 48, of 1739 Niedermeyer dr., in the left lane of traffic on Ross lane. Both vehicles were heavily damaged.

State police informed Rosie Brood that a complaint would be signed against her charging failure to travel on the right side of the highway.

## Suggestions Made for Using Howard Prairie

County Judge Earl Miller, Friday noted other recommendations made for use of Howard Prairie water area for recreation, but said the county court has not acted on the recommendations.

A buoy line will be stretched from approximately the north end of the dam and will extend in a straight line to a point of land north of Willow Springs creek.

Waterskiing will be restricted to the cove, according to the recommendations made by representatives of sporting groups which will use the lake.

**No Restrictions**  
There will be no restrictions on bank fishing during waterskiing periods, from the southeast shoreline of the main island, since this area will be used probably mainly for launching skiboats, or for take off and landings.

The waterskiing and fast boating restriction to the south side of the buoy line would include the area east of the main island. Fast boating should be interpreted as traveling at speeds more than 10 miles per hour. Subcommittee Chairman Jim Eberhart, Ashland, explained.

Boats traveling over 10 miles per hour should remain at least 100 feet from shore lines, the group recommended. This would not apply to the east and north shores of the island where waterskiing starts and finishes. Purpose of the speed limit is to protect swimmers.

## SOC Study Body Elections Slated

Ashland—Student body elections at Southern Oregon college are at a high pitch this year, with the introduction of serious campaigning for write-in candidates.

Dale Truax, Ashland, and Bob Burrows, Cave Junction, are both challenging the ballot candidates for ASSOC president. Those who filed by dead-line time were Larry Barleen and Barry Pitts, Klamath Falls, and Neil Green, Central Point. Truax is also listed on the ballot as a candidate for first vice president against Ted Pauck, Lakeview. Dianna Banister, Lakeview, is campaigning for write-in votes for student body treasurer, opposing the only listed candidate, Priscilla Walker from Stockton, Calif.

The second vice president spot is being contested by William Beber, Ashland, and Terry Tallis, Hills, Calif. Joan Isham, Grants Pass, and Amy Kerr, Klamath Falls, are candidates for secretary.

Running for representatives-at-large are George Brown, Applegate, Karen Elle, Lakeview, Noble Adamek, Powers, William Speers, Grants Pass, Douglas Thompson, Klamath Falls, and Judy Thrift, Coos Bay.

Student body elections will be held Wednesday, April 20.

## Handlers to Elect Representatives

Winter Pear handlers in the Medford district will elect representatives to the Winter Pear Control committee in Medford April 21. The committee, whose headquarters are in Portland, announced that the elections for handler member and alternates of the committee from the Medford district will be held at noon at the Rogue Valley Country club.

The control committee administers the Winter Pear Marketing Order covering the states of Oregon, Washington and California. This committee establishes each year the minimum grade, size and quality standards under which winter pears are marketed from the Pacific Coast states.

Any person who handles pears is eligible to participate in this meeting, providing he did not participate in the previous grower election meeting held April 15.

The handler position which is to be filled at the April 21 meeting is now held by R. W. Gray, member; Joe Naumes, first alternate; Harold A. Holmes, second alternate. Names of those elected will be submitted to the secretary of agriculture for official appointment to the Winter Pear Control committee, and will serve for a one-year term.

The Oregon State Bar is sponsoring a state-wide high school editorial contest on the theme "Justice and Peace Through the Law," the winners to be announced at the Law Day ceremonies in Portland May 2.

## Schumacher to Present Program

Salem—The 50th legislative assembly of the interim committee on taxation will meet in the state capitol building in Salem April 18 and 19.

Ray J. Schumacher, Jackson county assessor, will present his five-point program for changing the Oregon tax structure at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, April 19.

On the agenda for the Monday session are taxation of hardware and implements, timber and transportation taxes, a proposal for taxation of timber by the Industrial Forestry association, taxation of personal property, tax administration and appeals, exemptions from taxation, progress report on enforcement of insurance retaliatory equalization clause, comments on audit of revenue collections and taxation of motor vehicles and motor vehicle fuels.

Tuesday speakers and subjects are Hideto Tomita, department of finance and administration, on background information on a department of revenue; Rep. George Annala, Hood River, on taxation of members of cooperatives, and broadening the income tax base through substitution of a tax credit for personal and

dependency exemptions, tax commission testimony on trend of revenue collections, bond and tax limitations, fire district bond limitations and tax limitations.
