Confusion Exists On Disability of Employed Persons

Some confusion still exists with respect to the severity of a disabling condition which must exist to enable an employee or self-employed person to qualify for benefits under the social security program, according to Edward B. Jacobson, district manager of the Medford office of the social security administration.

"There seem to be two common misunderstandings regarding these payments," Jacobson stated. "One is that they may be received by a person who is temporarily disabled; the other is that they may be received only by someone who is completely incapacitated."

Requirements Explained

Actually, he explained, the requirements are that the disability has existed for at least six months, prevents the worker from performing "any substantial gainful activity," and is expected to be of long-continued and indefinite duration. In addition, the disabled person must have worked under social security for at least five years out of the 10 years immediately before he became disabled.

There can be no hard and fast rule as to who will qualify under these stipulations, Jacobson explained. After the basic six months requirement has been met, each case must be judged on its merits, based on the best medical evidence available.

He urged anyone having questions regarding the disability insurance program to contact the nearest social security office. Applications may be filed and medical evidence submitted as much as two months before the end of the six month waiting period, he added.

The Medford office is located at 1005 East Main st. and is open from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

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Three Arrested for Grants Pass Police

Medford police Friday turned three persons over to Josephine county deputies who suspect the trio of being responsible for a \$1,000 safe burglary in Grants Pass, April 10.

The suspects, two men and a woman, were arrested by Medford police Wednesday after they had been observed acting in a suspicious manner near several Medford stores.

Police identified them as Michel Joseph Coallier, 35, of Vernon, B.C., Kathleen Jewel McClellan, 35, and James Orley Manies, 35, both of Sacramento, Calif.

They were held in the city and then the county jail until Josephine county warrants could be issued for their arrest.

SHIP BILLIONS IN ARMS
Washington — (UP) — Arms shipments under the nation's military aid program over the last 10 years have totaled \$23,300,000,000. Of this, European allies got \$12,900,000,000 or less than half, while Far Eastern allies received \$5,300,000,000 in aid and Near Eastern and So. Asian nations got \$3,300,000,000. France was the biggest beneficiary, according to Pentagon figures getting \$4,300,000,000 in American arms, followed by Formosa with about \$2 billion and Italy with \$1,990,000,000.

State Commission Sets Meeting in GP

Oregon State Public Welfare commission will hold the next in a series of area meetings in Grants Pass, Friday, April 29, starting at 9 a.m., according to Miss Jeanne Jewett, state public welfare administrator.

This is the third of a series of area meetings designed to bring state staff and commission closer to area problems and to meet with the people concerned with them, Miss Jewett explained. The first such meeting was held in La Grande last October and the second in Salem in January.

The meeting will be held in the Grants Pass library auditorium at Northwest Fifth st. between B and C sts. near the courthouse. A no-host luncheon has been scheduled at noon at the Redwoods hotel. Attending will be county administrators and representatives of county welfare commissions from Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, and Josephine counties. Legislature members and members of the interim public welfare study committee have been invited, Miss Jewett said.

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Judge Rules Against Unions

Portland — (UP) — Two striking newspaper unions Friday lost legal actions against the struck Oregonian and Oregon Journal in the National Labor Relations board decision and in federal district court.

U. S. District Judge John Kilkenny dismissed a suit of the Portland Web Pressmen's Union Local 17 which sought an order restoring the union's status.

The judge found that the members of the union "clearly violated the 'no work stoppage' and the 'no strike' provisions of the contract when members walked out, on and subsequent to Nov. 10, 1959." He said it was "absolutely clear that parties intended to provide an orderly method for the settlement of disputes and that there would be no work stoppage or strike."

He found that failure to cross the picket lines was a breach of contract.

ISSUE REFUGEE STAMPS
Geneva — (UP) — Seventy-four nations simultaneously issued more than 180 postal stamps and cancellations marking World Refugee Year Thursday. The unprecedented action was aimed at raising a million dollars for the international appeal.
