Mrs. Virginia Meyers of the Medford High school reported on a typical parent-teacher association panel discussion held at the convention. A cook, a teacher, a parent, a student and a school board member took part, discussing some of the problems confronting school cooks.

Mrs. Meyers reported that education of the parents concerning food preparation, menus, food service, and etiquette taught the children would definitely benefit the local cafeteria program.

A description of the new Madison High school building in Portland was given by Mrs. Virginia Waite of Medford. She said the \$5 million structure includes a snack

bar, along with the cafeteria, and was established to keep the youngsters from leaving the school grounds for a "snack."
