Elmo Smith Poses Problems in Public Health, Other Fields

Elmo E. Smith, Albany, ex-governor and candidate for the U.S. Senate, yesterday posed several problems grouped around public health, education, science and industry and economy which he said the nation must face.

He told those attending the Jackson County Republican Women's luncheon in the Red Cross building that he was not presenting solutions, merely the problems.

Oregon has one of the outstanding mental health programs in the country, he noted. He said while governor he recognized and sought the answers to the problems of the aged. When governor, Smith said, he urged that a council for the aged be formed.

Great Issues
In the field of health, medical and hospital aid for the aged will become one of the great issues of the political campaign. The problem does exist and must be dealt with, he emphasized. Those already on social security need a direct grant from the government, Smith declared, adding that this is something which must be faced immediately as the humane thing to do, while the long range approach holds out something better in the future for those not facing the immediate problems of old age.

Money is needed to go into research on preserving the health of the aged, he said. "We have a very real problem in automation," the senatorial candidate said. Cancellation of the Bomarc missile program has thrown a large number of technicians out of work suddenly, men who had been trained only in a certain narrow phase of the missile construction, he pointed out.

Creates More Jobs
"It's true that automation and mechanization create more jobs than they wipe out, but this is not the answer to the problem of workers who are suddenly out of work," Smith stated.

"Through industry we must maintain a continued program of diversification and education. We need all the technical skills that these technicians have."

The ex-governor noted that economy is the most unattractive of subjects. He indicated it would be better for the government to take less tax money in the beginning, rather than grant greater tax deductions as "kickbacks."

Those who want greater federal aid for education should look at the U.S. postal service, Smith said. There is the greatest dissatisfaction among the mass of federal employees, he stated, and every time these federal employees want pay raises they must go to Washington, D. C., to get it. It would be the same way with teachers if their salaries were completely paid by the federal government, he said.

"Instead of our overall tax burden being relieved in this state we would probably be paying more taxes to pull up those states who are not spending as much per capita for education as we are."

"If you don't think the federal government will run the schools, look what happened to the yellow lines on your highways," Smith reminded his audience.

The booklet on county government prepared by the Jackson County League of Women Voters is good, since it will help the people to learn of the scope, area and function of county government, Smith commented. This, he indicated, provides a foundation for developing more interest in state and national level government.

Sen. Morse Charges Humphrey Allowed Racism in Primary

Washington—(UPI)—Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) charged Monday that Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.) had permitted "racism" to be injected into the District of Columbia presidential primary.

Morse said Humphrey is backing Frank Reeves, a Negro lawyer representing the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, for national committee man from the district because "he's colored."

The Oregon senator said he had received a wire from Negro leaders who back Humphrey urging his support for a qualified Negro for national committee man.

Morse is supporting a white man, J. C. Turner, head of the operating engineers union for the post. He told a news conference that Humphrey's supporters were advertising the race of one of their members. Matched May 3.

"The words white, colored, Protestant, Catholic and Jew have no legitimate place in American political campaigns," Morse said.

Morse predicted that he would win the D.C. and Oregon primaries. His name is also on the ballot in the Maryland primary on May 10. The Oregon test is May 20.

He said Humphrey had cut labor's "jugal vein" by voting for the Landrum-Griffith bill. He also accused Humphrey of settling for a "half-load" on civil rights.

Morse said he would support Stevenson if he does not win the prize himself. For second choice, he said he would take Sen. Stuart Symington for declining to campaign in the Oregon primary against the "favorite son"—Morse.

Anti-Castro Forces Attack East Cuban City

Havana—(UPI)—An insurgent bank of troops believed led by ex-Maj. Manuel Beaton attacked the east Cuban city of Palma Soriano today in one of the boldest moves yet carried out by the anti-Castro forces. Palma Soriano is provincial headquarters for the army.

Prisoners Said Taken
Reports from Oriente province said the insurgents battled government troops for half an hour before being repelled. The reports said the government troops took some prisoners but there was no immediate confirmation here.

The attack was considered significant here because of its very boldness, with the insurgents daring to come out of the Sierra Maestra mountains in a hit-run raid. Premier Fidel Castro has been personally directing operations against the guerrillas.

New Opposition
Castro returned to Havana Monday and ran into reports of new opposition. Today he resumed his attacks on the United States and said President Eisenhower had "no right" to speak out against the Cuban government.

Anti-government guerrilla activity has been reported during the past week in Oriente Province, at Cuba's eastern tip; in Pinar Del Rio Province to the west, and in the central province of Las Villas.

Coos Democrats Endorse Morse
Coquille—(UPI)—The Coos County Democratic Central Committee Monday night endorsed the candidacy of Sen. Wayne Morse for Oregon for the Democratic presidential nomination.

The endorsement was made by a vote of 16 to 2. The argument against endorsement was one of not endorsing any candidate in the May 20 primary.

Woman Gets Early Walkathon Start

Reno—(UPI)—British cross-country walker Dr. Barbara Moore hit the road before dawn today in an attempt to catch up with her two countrymen who are 100 miles ahead of her.

The 56-year-old vegetarian spent the night near Verdi and then started off again at 3:45 a.m. on her way into Reno.

Meanwhile, Royal Air Force Sgt. Patrick Moloney, 34, and Army Sgt. Mervyn Evans, 33, broke camp 10 miles east of Lovelock on Highway 40 and took up the brisk cadence they expected would have them more than a third of the way through the state by nightfall.

All three are trying to break the transcontinental hiking record of 79 days, 10 hours and 10 minutes set back in 1926.
