Tape Recorder Tells Trysts of Beverly Aadland

Hollywood - (UPI) - More trouble for fun-loving Beverly Aadland, 17, loomed today with the disclosure of a secret tape recording which purportedly tells of her romances-for-pay.

Beverly's mother, Mrs. Florence Aadland, 53, talks in the recording about affairs she said Beverly had with two "big name" Hollywood celebrities, a Beverly Hills socialite and a Jamaican millionaire, according to the district attorney's office.

Men Unidentified - Manley J. Bowler, chief deputy district attorney, declined to identify the men named in the recording and said his office had no plans to question them.

He said the recording might be used, however, at Beverly's delinquency hearing in juvenile court May 2 to support the state's contention that Beverly is without proper supervision.

There were no plans to try to introduce the recording at Mrs. Aadland's arraignment Monday on charges of contributing to Beverly's delinquency, Bowler said.

Blackmail Attempt Charged - Mrs. Aadland, when she first learned of the recording's existence through news stories Tuesday, stormed to the district attorney's office, charging the recording had been made in an attempt to blackmail her.

She sought to talk with District Attorney William B. McKesson but was denied admittance.

Escapee Feeds on Poisoned Wheat

Salem - (UPI) - State police theorized today that a hungry escaped convict cooked himself some poisoned wheat in a shed hideout south of here on the John B. Woods and Son Fir Cone farm.

Fingerprints found in the shed matched those of Ronald Fred Wilson, 22, who got away from a milk detail at the state prison annex Saturday night. He was still at large today.

A nearby trailer house was reported burglarized by its owner Monday and this led to a search of the area. Guns, clothing, food and a pickup truck were taken from the trailer owner, John R. Oblack, who was away when the burglary occurred.

In the shed police found part of a wheat mixture that had been cooked in a coffee pot on an old hot plate. The wheat, kept in the shed, is poisoned, used to kill field mice. On the floor of the shed was found regurgitation containing some of the poisoned wheat.

Wilson, serving a term from Benton county for larceny, is not considered dangerous.
