

Suit Seeks \$1,800,000 In Damages

Chicago — (UPI) — A magazine writer, battling what he calls fixed fights on television, was under subpoena today in a \$1,800,000 damage suit filed by the former president of the International Boxing Club.

The subpoena was served on James Stewart Gordon Tuesday shortly after he testified at a hearing of the Illinois Athletic Commission into Gordon's charges against boxing in the April, 1960, issue of Reader's Digest.

The hearing had wound up in shouted charges between Gordon and Bernard Glickman, manager of boxer Virgil Akins. Gordon had said in the article that Glickman was involved with Frank Carbo, reputed underworld boss of boxing.

Asked to Substantiate

Frank Gilmer, chairman of the Illinois commission, called the hearing to ask Gordon to substantiate his "fix" charges as they related to Illinois.

The damage suit was filed by Truman Gibson Jr., former International Boxing Club president, against Readers Digest Assn., Inc., and the J. Walter Thompson advertising agency.

Gibson's suit charged that Gordon's article made untrue and defamatory statements that Gibson had underworld links and that fights which he promoted were staged.

Gordon also was reprimanded by Gilmer after the writer failed to produce evidence to show that fights were fixed in Illinois. Gilmer refused to let Gordon introduce evidence of fixed fights in New York and Washington.

Joe Iraci Total Good for 13th

Toledo — (UPI) — City Motor Sales of Detroit rolled a high open team score of 2859 in Tuesday night's action in the American Bowling Congress tournament, but it was a long way from the top in the standings.

Chico State Takes Two From Raiders

Ashland—Chico State college swept a baseball twinbill from Southern Oregon college yesterday afternoon by scores of 4-0 and 7-2 on a pair of pitching performances which yielded only five hits.

Chico's Don Martin hurled a one-hitter in the first game in giving up the lone base hit to Chuck Nevi in the third inning.

Martin struck out three and walked only one batter while the Raider's hurler Don Vannice fanned four and walked only one. Vannice turned in a fine pitching job after the disastrous four run first inning. From the second inning on he allowed but one hit.

Twice the score was tied and once the Raiders were ahead in the second game but the trouble of no base hits when men were on base plagued the Raiders.

John Younger went the route for SOC and lost his first game of the season after winning two straight. He struck out four and walked three. Jack Delbar got the win for Chico as he worked his way out of trouble during three innings. Delbar whiffed three and issued free passes to four.

Nevi was the only Raider to reach third base in the first game. He singled and moved around on a pair of fielder's choices.

Chico scored quickly in the first inning on two singles and a two-run double. A third single drove home the third run of the inning.

The Wildcatters fourth run came in the third on an overthrow at first with the runner ending up safe on second. A base hit scored the unearned run.

Chico again drew first blood in the second game on a dropped fly ball, a hit batter, and a run producing base hit.

SOC countered with one in the fifth when Bob Jones doubled, Nevi walked, Kerm McLemore walked, and Jim Dietz singled in a run. An infield out stopped the Raider flurry with the bases loaded.

Chico went ahead 2-1 in the sixth on a fielder's choice, sacrifice, and base hit.

The tally was knotted again in the bottom of the sixth when Raider John Cook was hit on the foot and Jones tripled him home with only one out. A squeeze bunt and

strikeout ended the final Raider threat.

Jones was the big Raider hitter in the second game with a double and triple in three trips to the plate. He also scored a run and knocked in another.

Weather permitting, the Raiders were meeting Shasta college in a doubleheader this afternoon. A double-bill with Humboldt State college in Ashland and is set for Saturday at 1:30 p.m.

Burleson Will Meet Cunliffe

University of Oregon, Eugene — Stanford and Oregon, two of the nation's top collegiate track teams meet here at Hayward Field next Saturday at 1 p.m. in an affair which will be highlighted by the mile race between Capt. Ernie Cunliffe of the Indians and sophomore Droyl Burleson of the Ducks.

The meet begins a half hour earlier than usual and the mile, which could produce one of the fastest races ever run by an American, will be run at 1:30 p.m. rather than 2 p.m. as usual. The time was moved up to make it possible for local fans to watch both the track meet and the Oregon-Washington State baseball game at 3 p.m.

Cunliffe has started the track world with his tremendous improvement in the mile this season. He has cut nine seconds off his previous best and ran 4:02.3 to jump into the top half dozen American milers of all time.

Burleson, the brilliant sophomore who won the U.S. Russian, national AAU and Pan American Games championships as well as setting a new freshman record in his varsity season, is rated as America's top 1500 meter hope in the Olympic Games and his race against Cunliffe will be his stiffest test until the NCAA meet in June.

May Go To Relay

The meet is far from a one-event affair, and Coach Bill Bowerman said he thinks it will go to the relay before the outcome is decided. In addition to the mile, the middle distance races will be well matched with Oregon's crew of Sig Ohlemann in the 440, Burleson and Ohlemann in the 880, Larson in the mile, and Dick Miller in the two mile challenging the talented Indian entry list of Bob Besse and Dick Lassen (both 48.9) in the 440, Cunliffe (1:47.3) and Rich Keller (1:51.9) in the 880, Burtill Lundh (4:10.9) as the second man in the mile, and Bob Monzingo (9:10.8) in the two mile.

Oregon may have the edge with Dave Edstrom (14.1) in the high hurdles, but the big decathlon ace will have trouble with Indian Dean Smith (23.9) in the lows.

In the field events the Stanford crew has a clear edge in the shot with Jerry Winters (56-10 1/9) while the Ducks are favored in the pole vault with Phil Paquin consistent over 14 feet.

The other field events are very evenly matched, much the same as the track events, and the performances of the day will decide the outcome of the meet. Oregon ripped Stanford last year, 71-60, but making it two in a row appears questionable.
