**Child Guidance
Clinic Banquet
Set April 29**

George H. Barnett, vice president of the Family Service Association of America, will be the guest speaker for the Child Guidance Association annual dinner meeting Friday, April 29, according to Harold Snodgrass, president of the clinic's advisory board.

Barnett, an attorney in San Jose, Calif., and past president of the Santa Clara Bar Association, will speak on whether family counseling is a community asset, and on what a family agency does.

His talk will round out a year-long effort by the Child Guidance and Family Counseling boards and members of other interested groups to acquaint the public with the need for a family service agency in Jackson county.

As past president of the Santa Clara Family Service Agency, past president of the Community Welfare Council of Santa Clara county, former chairman of Social Research and Planning division, a board member of the California Association for Health and Welfare, Barnett is familiar with the social problems on the local as well as national level, Snodgrass said.

Considering the proposed expansion of the Child Guidance clinic to take the family counseling, Snodgrass urged anyone interested in the problem to attend the dinner, or to hear the talk.

The dinner will be held at Medford High school at 6:30 p.m. Barnett's address will be approximately 8 p.m.

Ben Day will introduce the speaker following a program of music by the Populaires, a choral group from Southern Oregon college under the direction of Maynard Hadley.

There will be a short business meeting, including election of new board members and officers.

**Rain Making Still
Puzzles Scientists**

Washington (Science Service) - A survey of three years of rain making efforts in California has left unanswered the question of whether seeding clouds with silver iodide thrown into the air from the ground actually produces more rainfall than would have occurred naturally.

The scientific survey did show that further experiments are needed to solve the puzzle of why some clouds produce rain and others do not, and of whether man's interference can effect rainfall amounts.

Dr. Jerry Neyman, Elizabeth L. Scott and Marija Vasilevskis of the University of California, Berkeley, reported on the effectiveness of a scientific cloud seeding program during the period from 1957 through 1959 in the current issue of Science. The Santa Barbara project they studied is rare in weather control projects because the determination of whether or not to seed at any time was decided, in effect, as by the flip of a coin.

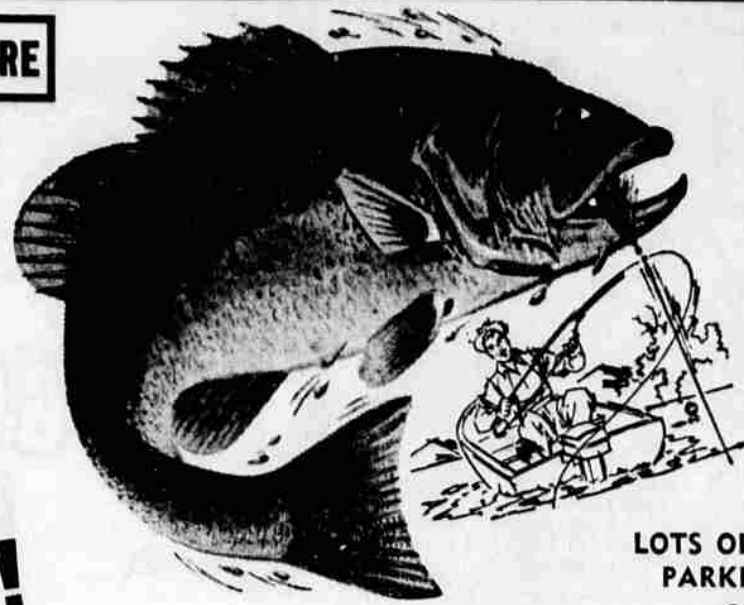
