Painting and Sculpture of Warren Wolf to be Exhibited

An oil painting and sculpture by Warren Wolf, 1517 South Ivy street, both titled "Men of Matthew," have been accepted for exhibit during the 1960 Religious Art Festival in Rochester, N.Y.

The works will be exhibited at the Central Presbyterian church, Rochester, from Thursday, April 28, through May 8. The Festival includes

selected works from all phases of the arts including music, theater, poetry, painting, and sculpture.
