

Lincoln PTA Hears Talks On Budget

The budget for Medford public schools was the topic of a program at the Lincoln Parent-Teacher association meeting April 14.

J. Russell Acheson, assistant superintendent of Medford schools, and Frank C. Bash, a member of the school board, discussed various aspects of the budget.

Mr. Acheson explained the preparation of the budget and Mr. Bash discussed the equalization of school funds, basic school support and the probability of more federal aid for schools.

Mr. Bash praised the local schools for the excellent learning which he said is evidenced by achievement tests. Brochures giving a detailed explanation of the budget were distributed.

Henry DeVoss, a Medford special education teacher and fishing authority, showed slides and spoke about local fishing areas. He refuted the argument that "fishing isn't what it used to be," declaring that there is now more water and more fish.

Students of Mrs. E. S. Bowers' fourth-grade Brownie troop presented the United States flag.

Mrs. Max Weston, PTA president, presented to the school a large 50-star embroidered U.S. flag and smaller 50-star flags for each classroom.

In accepting the gifts, Jack Holmes, the principal, said that Lincoln would be the only school in the district which now has all 50-star flags.

Miss Anna Laura Honts' fourth grade won the trophy for having the largest percentage of parents in attendance for the fifth time this year.

Wildlife Experts Issue Bulletin On 'Game Foods'

The care a sportsman gives fish between the stream and the dinner table can make a big difference in the way it tastes. The same is true for fowl and big game.

Proper handling is explained in a new Oregon State college extension service bulletin which details ways to clean and cook fish, fowl and big game.

The bulletin pictures how to pluck game birds, how to clean a trout, how to fillet a fish, how to skin a catfish, and how to skin a perch. A big game chart locates bones, diagrams meat cuts, and suggests how to use various cuts.

Instructions for dressing 21 species of big game, waterfowl, upland game birds, and fish are summarized in chart form. The chart also tells how to prepare various species for locker storage or cooking, and gives cooking instructions.

The bulletin was written by Arthur S. Einarson, leader of the Oregon Cooperative Wildlife Research unit, and Andrew S. Landforce, OSC extension wildlife management specialist.

Oregon residents may obtain free copies of "Game Foods" from their county extension office or from OSC bulletin clerk, Corvallis.

Scrape carrots, leave whole and cook until tender. Roll them in your favorite candied syrup and serve as a special treat at dinner.
