

Burley Feels He Can Race Even Faster

Eugene, Ore. — (UPI) — Don Burleson, University of Oregon sophomore who Saturday became the second American to run a sub-four minute mile, says he can run even faster. Burleson nipped Sanford's Ernie Cunliffe by about 12 yards in 3:58.6. The 19-year-old's time was a tenth of a second under that of California's Don Bowden, who ran a 3:58.7 mile at Stockton, Calif., in 1957.

"I think — I know I can run faster," Burleson said afterwards.

"It was relatively easy to kick by him (Cunliffe) going into the stretch and I had something left when the race was over."

Burleson is the 23rd miler to break the magic barrier. Cunliffe set the pace and ran 4:00.4, his all-time best, placing him among America's top three milers.

Ernie Works "You have to give Ernie a lot of credit," Burleson said. "He did all the work. It's easy for someone to follow and let the other guy set the pace."

Stanford Coach Payton Jordan had praise for Burleson, as well as his coach, Bill Bowerman.

"Bowerman and Burleson are a hard combination to beat," the Indian coach commented.

Burleson said he figured he had a sub four minute mile going during the race.

"On the third lap I knew we would be under," he said.

Burleson was timed in 62.5 for the first lap, 59.9 on the second, 58.8 in the third and finished with 57.4.

It's obvious that summer trip to Rome for the 1960 Olympic Games looks mighty good to Dyrrol Burleson, Bill Nieder and John Thomas.

Of course that jaunt is the target for scores of other Yank track and field stars, but right now it would be hard to find three better bets for the squad.

Burleson, 19, a sophomore at the University of Oregon, produced the fastest mile ever run by a United States citizen Saturday during a dual meet with Stanford. He was timed in 3:58.6 while dethroning Ernie Cunliffe of Stanford.

Nieder, warming up for his duel with Parry O'Brien next weekend at the Drake Relays, headed the shot 63 feet, 10 1/2 inches Saturday at the Kansas Relays in Lawrence, Kan. The 240-pound Nieder produced a 65-foot-7-inch toss April 2 at the Texas Relays and got off a heave of 66 feet, 1 1/2 inches during a warmup session last Saturday. The latter toss can't be submitted for approval as a record. O'Brien's listed world mark is 63.4.

Thomas, the Boston university youngster who will be the Olympic high jump favorite if he escapes injury, took part in his first outdoor meet since 1958 Saturday at Hanover, N. H. He cleared seven feet, 1/2 inch, bettering the NCAA mark of seven feet set by Charlie Dumas of Southern California in 1959 and

Ashland — Southern Oregon college gets back into Oregon Collegiate conference baseball action tomorrow at 3 p.m. in a single game against Oregon Tech on the Raider diamond.

"We will go with either Marty Vogler or John Younger as starting hurler," Raider coach Ted Schopf announced.

Overall it's a big week for the Raiders in OCC action. After the single game with OTI, the Raiders will venture north for a three game series with Portland State college starting Friday with a single game. Saturday the Raiders and Vika will meet in a doubleheader.

Schopf did some shuffling in the lineup last week when he moved Jess Munyon to left field and outfielder Kerm McMormore to the hot corner.

Jim Dietz and Chuck Nevi make up the keystone combination with Dietz at short and Nevi at second.

Jack Brown will hold down first base; Eldon Francis will be center field, and Phil Sword will tackle the catching chores.

If OTI goes with a left-hander on the mound either Bob Jones or John Cook will play right field. In the event of a righthander, Damien Rossetto will go in right.

OTI opened the OCC action with a triple loss to Eastern Oregon and dropped three over the week end to Oregon college.

With a new coach and virtually a new team the Owls have not been taken lightly. Last year the Raiders had beaten the Owls twice on their way to the OCC crown before OTI scored a 6-4 upset in extra innings in Klamath Falls.

Lewis, Little Ring Victors at Klamath Falls

Larry Lewis and Bobby Little of Medford Police Athletic league gained split decisions Saturday over Chiloquin rivals in boxing matches at the Klamath Falls armory.

In the main event Lewis matched against Duane McDaniels, piled up a good margin in the first two rounds, but hampered by a cold, began to tire in the third round.

The action was fast and furious, with both boys scoring with some good combinations. Lewis moved out fast and strong in the first two rounds, and McDaniels appearing to be the best in the third round.

The semi-windup saw Little tangling with Ramon Unive in a well mixed scrap.

Both boys started slowly and cautiously, each waiting for the other to lead in order to counter with heavier punches. Little started to press the attack and had Unive in trouble as the round ended. In the second round, Ramon came storming out of his corner determined to end it quickly, but the Medford PAL battler moved in to shoot hard hooks to the body that slowed Unive. Little was hurt by a hard right hand, but countered another body combination that had the Chiloquin boy gasping.

Crisp Punches

In the third stanza crisper punching by Bobby Little impressed both of the judges.

In a 120-round bout, Don Gray of Medford PAL, lost on a TKO at the end of the second round to Leon Weeks of Chiloquin. Gray fighting his first match as an amateur, and subbing for the ailing Billy Thomas, startled the Klamath fight fans by taking the fight to Weeks, who recently won the 125-pound title in the Southern Oregon Golden Gloves tournament. But, Gray, not knowing how to pace himself, faded badly in the closing seconds of the second round.

Jim Zack, coach of the PAL club, would like to arrange a double main event in a rematch for Lewis and McDaniels and Little and Unive, and is hoping that the bleacher seats and chairs ordered by the Armory board will soon be delivered to the Medford armory.

Black Tornado Hitting Headed By Lowell Dean

Led by the robust .538 average of Lowell Dean, the Medford High school baseball team has a healthy .320 batting mark for its first 10 games against prep competition this spring.

The Black Tornado actually has an 11-0 win loss record for the season, including a mix with the Southern Oregon college jayvees.

Dean has 14 hits and 18 runs batted in to pace the Tornado in both departments. Mike Parsons is second in the average category and in total hits with .500 and 12, respectively. Jerry Anderson has a fat .425 swatting mark. Jim Barry is hitting .388, Dick Ragsdale .370, Bob Quinney .348 and Ken Jensen .315.

Ragsdale has the most runs scored, 12, and he leads in stolen bases, six. Home run hitters have been Mike Parsons, with two, Anderson, Barry and Quinney. Anderson, Cal Dean and Parsons each have a pair of triples to their credit and statistics also show Lowell Dean, Ken Durkee and Jensen with one three-bagger each. In doubles Lowell Dean is leader with five.

Three Wins Each

Three Medford pitchers, Anderson, Quinney and Herb Wheeler each have three wins. Wheeler has not given up an earned run and Pat McLaughlin, allowing only one, has an .875 ER average. FRA of the entire pitching staff is just .984.

In 64 innings pitched, Medford hurlers have held rival batters to 34 hits and the opposition has put over just 15 runs. Nine of the runs were earned. Wheeler has struck out 18 batters.

In fielding the Tornado has recorded five double plays and has a team average of .937 with perfect marks supplied by Anderson, Lowell Dean, Durkee, McLaughlin, Bud Lowery and Thompson.

Lowell Dean, at first base, has the putout lead with 58 and Cal Dean, fielding at shortstop, paces assists with 23. Eighteen errors have been charged against Medford.

Next tussles for the Tornadoes are out of town to meet a trip to Central Point to meet Crater on Friday and a jaunt to Ashland on Saturday. Both appearances will be doubleheaders.

Heist blasted out two three-run homers and a pair of singles to lead Sacramento to an 18-1, victory over Spokane in the second game of a PCL doubleheader after the Sacs had won the opener, 3-2.

Thus, the Solons now share the league leadership with Spokane and Portland. Each team has six wins and four losses.

Portland divided a Sunday twin bill with San Diego, winning the first game, 8-4, and dropping the nightcap, 5-1. In the other game played Sunday, Seattle shut out Tacoma, 3-0. Vancouver's game at Salt Lake City was postponed because of rain.

Heist's batting outburst in the seven-inning second game produced a total of eight Solon runs and gave Jack Caffery, who scattered seven hits, his second win against one loss. Elmer Singleton gave the Indians two runs in the first inning and then closed the gate the rest of the way to lead Sacramento to victory in the opener.

Anderson Goes Distance Pitching told the story in the San Diego - Portland clash. Bob Anderson went the distance and chipped in with a couple of timely hits to give Portland the win in the first game but the Beavers couldn't cope with hurling of

Rodolfo Arias in the second contest. Arias was in command throughout and weakened only in the fifth inning when Portland pushed across its lone tally.

Steady Ray Ripplemeyer registered his second straight shutout as he effectively spaced nine hits to give Seattle its win over Tacoma. The Rainier righthander left at least one Giant stranded on the bases in every inning.

Seattle scored all of its runs in the sixth inning on Joe Taylor's home run, Gordy Coleman's single, Bill Hain's double and Jerry Zimmerman's single.

Only two games were played Saturday in the PCL. Portland defeated San Diego, 4-2, and Tacoma turned back Seattle, 6-3. Spokane's game at Sacramento and Vancouver-Salt Lake contest at Salt Lake were rained out.

Len Dobry in winning the shot put with a heave of 44 feet three quarters of an inch, and Don Korth in the javelin with a 179 feet seven inch toss captured the only other two first place awards for the Raiders.
