The Family Council

Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a Judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Gloria R. - I don't want anything to do with my father. Roger D. - They should be reconciled.

Gloria R. - My parents were divorced when I was 4 years old. My father remarried and raised a family. My mother didn't marry again until I was 19 and away at college.

I have had very little contact with my father in these years. I always felt uncomfortable in his home. He took very little interest in me. Now I am about to be married and my fiancé says he would like to get acquainted with my father. Roger happens to be in the same business and feels it would be beneficial to know him.

I have no desire to give my father the satisfaction of Roger coming to him for favors. I don't want a thing from him, and I'm hurt that Roger should want to gain something at the expense of my feelings. It's all wrong.

Roger D. - If Gloria's father is as bad as she says, he won't help do anything for us anyway. If he isn't we really ought to know it.

In spite of the way things look, that isn't my main motive in urging Gloria to contact him. I had the idea before I even knew his business and Gloria knows that. She always spoke bitterly about him.

Sometimes women in Gloria's situation find they can love an estranged parent after they have found satisfaction in married life. A child estranged from a parent always feels rejected by the parents. When he finds acceptance in love he is more at peace with himself and willing to give of his warm feelings to those around him.

Gloria can't enjoy that sense of security in being loved as long as her fiancé shows he wants to change her basic feelings and is ready to fight and oppose her on a matter that ordinarily doesn't concern a man in love. We think Roger should step out of this area until Gloria asks for his opinion.

A special federal Grand Jury in the northern district of Illinois indicted Accardo Monday night on three counts of filing false income tax returns. Conviction could mean a maximum prison sentence of nine years and fines totaling \$15,000.

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Heart Disease Center Planned

Portland - (UPI) - Four hundred monkeys will be used in research near here to study heart disease and other ailments.

Grants totaling \$1,917,275 were announced today for the research facility near Orenco in Washington county about 10 miles west of here.

The money comes from the National Institutes of Health, a federal agency. Most of it will go toward construction of facilities which are expected to be ready early next year.

The center will be administered by the University of Oregon Medical School and the Medical Research Foundation of Oregon, Inc.
